WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION LAW

The proposed compensation amendment is one of the most reactionary and carefully laid schemes to tie Oregon's working people, farmers and industries hand and foot, that the people have been called upon to consider. The law is a constitutional amendment and once adopted it can only be changed by the vote of the people.

It creates a three-man commission with absolute power to make their own laws and administer this law. This commission is to be appointed by the governor and being appointive takes from the people all the right of recall.

Into the hands of this commission will be placed the power to compel any employee or group of employees in the state to insure in the state compensation fund by the mere declaration that their occupation is hazardous. It is now optional with the employee whether he so insures.

The present compensation law guarantees every working man specific compensation and care when injured. This amendment would probably create a statewide medical and hospital trust, because the law specifically states that employee or employer cannot provide medical and surgical aid to crippled working men except by doctors selected by the commission.

There is only one way to save Oregon and her workers, farmers and industries from this menace and that is to vote it down.

LaFollette News

Portland—Ernest Kroner, LaFollette and Wheeler state campaign manager, brands the claim of Ralph Williams, republican national committeeman for Oregon, for a thirty thousand majority for Coolidge, as ridiculous. Kroner says with a vote that may vary from 250,000 to 300,000, any claim is ridiculous. LaFollette headquarters in this city have received reports from nearly fifty persons throughout the state that indicate a victory for the independent national ticket.

R. A. Haste, private secretary to Senator Wheeler, was in Oregon two days in the latter part of last week. He brought to headquarters cheering reports from eastern and middle western states. He says, among other things, that the strong labor vote in Pennsylvania and the open support of LaFollette by the democratic primaries that Pennsylvania will be in the LaFollette column. Haste claims Ohio, New York, Illinois and Missouri—states that are generally classified as doubtful, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Nebraska and all the Pacific coast and Northwestern states, he says, are safe for LaFollette.

THE DEFENSE OF OUR LIBERTIES

In a clear statement of the danger involved in tampering with the authority of the United States Supreme Court, "Liberty" magazine says editorially:

"What would happen if Congress or one of the legislatures of a State should pass a law declaring that the Roman Catholic Church, or the Methodist Episcopal Church, or the Baptist or Presbyterian Church is the official church of the United States, and that no citizen may hold any other religious belief?"

"That law, as we all know, would be declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of the nation or by the Supreme Court of the State in which the law was passed.

"What would happen if Congress or one of the State legislatures should pass a law providing that no one should criticize any public official; or that no newspaper or book should be published without the consent of a government official or committee of Congress or the Legislature; or that citizens should not be permitted to assemble, however peacefully, to petition for a redress of any grievance?"

"Such a law would be declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of the nation or by the Supreme Court of the State in which it was passed.

"What would happen if Congress or a State Legislature should pass a law declaring that no person charged with a crime should have the right to trial by a jury of his fellow citizens, or that he should have no right to counsel?"

"That law would also be declared unconstitutional by the courts and so would a law providing that a citizen's property may be taken for a public use without just compensation established in an impartial proceeding, or a law fixing an excessive sum as bail or apply a cruel or unusual punishment.

"But, there are political leaders who profess to be friends of

human liberty and progress, who propose to deprive the Supreme Court of the power to declare such laws unconstitutional, provided Congress passes them again after they have been declared unconstitutional by the court.

"It is argued that Congress will always respect these rights of the individual asserted in our constitution.

"Experience refutes this argument. That is why the founders of this republic gave the protection of our civil rights to a separate and co-ordinate branch of government. The purpose of the founders was to protect the individual in the enjoyment of his rights as against any agency of government, whether executive or legislative, for they knew from experience that a parliament or legislative body could and would oppress as well as a monarch or other executive. And subsequent experience proved the founders were right.

"The American system of liberty is founded on the principle that there are certain rights of the individual of which he may not be deprived even by the will of a majority. That principle is the most precious of our possessions as a free people, and the proposal to deprive the Supreme Court of its power to defend it is a proposal to destroy it."—Industrial News.

Overfeeding Pullets, Mistake.

Overfeeding pullets just coming into production is a mistake to be avoided according to the findings of the Oregon station. If the pullets have free access to dry mash, then the grain feed should be divided and fed morning and evening. Feeding 4 pounds per 100 birds in the morning and 8 pounds per 100 at evening, or better still, all they will clean up in the morning in two hours and enough at night to leave a little in the litter when they go to roost, is about right. The busy pullet well fed but not overfed is the pullet that lays.

Farm Reminders.

Putting the pullets into the laying house at one time is not so effective as putting an advance guard of one-fourth the total number in first, says the O. A. C. experiment station. These pullets if placed in the house two or three days in advance of the main flock, will learn to use the roosts. When the rest of the flock is put into the house, this advance guard will show the others how to use the roosts. The Oregon station has found that if all the flock is put in at once, crowding in the corners even with mature pullets is not uncommon.

Wax moths or bee moths sometimes attack a colony and do a great deal of damage, says H. A. Scullen, bee specialist at O. A. C. When the moths or larvae are not too numerous they may be removed by hand. In severe cases the colony is fumigated with carbon bisulfide.

All cracks are tightly closed and then a tablespoonful of carbon bisulfide is poured on a cloth laid over the top of the hive. It is best to do this in mild weather as the gas generated from the evaporation of the carbon bisulfide will have more effect. The gas is allowed to act for 24 hours. As carbon bisulfide is explosive, care is taken to keep all matches, cigarettes and other burning articles away from it.

Wax moths do not normally attack a strong colony, so after they have been cleaned up it is well to investigate the cause. This weakened condition may be due to disease, queenlessness, lack of stores, or some other cause.
