DISTRICT VOTES TAX AND PLANS WORK

Monday evening in the City hall a meeting of Road District No. 7 was held with H. C. Stephens acting as chairman and J. K. Ely, secretary. The meeting was opened for general discussion and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that there be and there is hereby levied, a special road tax of five mills, on all taxable property in Road District No. 7, Clackamas County, Oregon to be expended for the improvement of the following roads or streets within said district, subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth:

- Zobrist street between 3rd and 4th streets, \$60.
- Pierce street between 8th and 10th streets, \$100.
- Pierce street between 4th and 5th streets, \$60.
- Curran street between 3rd and 4th streets, \$50.
- Broadway between 6th and 4th streets, \$450.

For general street improvement as directed by the council, balance of the tax.
Said appropriations are made conditioned on the interested property owners in the districts befitted thereby, meeting dollar for dollar the appropriations above set forth and depositing with the City Recorder, on or before June 1, 1925, the sums above set forth. In case of failure so to meet and match said appropriations, then and in that event, the sum so to be matched may be spent in the improvement of any streets in the City of Estacada that the City Council may deem advisable.
