Sheriff-elect E. T. Mass of
Clackamas county has announced
his selection of deputies who
will take over their new duties
the first of the year.

Dave Palmbad, retired mer-
chant of Oak Grove, republican,
close friend of the new sheriff,
has been selected for the head
of the tax collection department,
to succeed I. D. Taylor, who
has been at the head of this de-
partment for several years.

Victor Thompson of Tualatin,
who has been field deputy under
County Assessor W. B. Cook,
has been selected by Mr. Mass
for the position of executive
deputy, and will hold the position
occupied by the late George L.
Story under Sheriff W. J. Wil-
son.

W. S. Eddy of Oregon City will
be field deputy, according to the
announcement of Mr. Mass. This
position is now held by H. H.
Hughes.

B. J. Staats of Oregon City
who served two years as deputy
under E. T. Mass during 1913
and 1914 when the latter was
sheriff, has been appointed county
traffic officer. His father, J.
B. Staats, now a minister at
Colton, served in this capacity
during the first term held by Mr.
Mass. J. B. Staats will take
the position now occupied by J.
W. Julian under Sheriff Wilson.

who is familiar with every line

COMMUNITY CLUB HOLDS MEETING

Community Club Meets

The regular meeting of the
Eastern Clackamas Community
club was held in the I. O. O. F.
hall, Friday evening, Nov. 28.
A "pot luck" dinner was served
at seven o'clock and those pres-
ent report an unusually fine meal.

The business meeting was
opened by the president, A. G.
Ames, and after the reading of
the minutes of the last meeting
a couple of clever playlets were
staged by the pupils of Miss Ly-
la McKinney. These were fol-
lowed by a song by the girls.
The regular business was then
taken up and all bills presented
were ordered paid. The meet-
ing was opened to a general dis-
cussion of the needs of the com-
munity. It was the opinion of
those present, that Estacada
should put forth every effort to
secure road signs so that auto-
ists might readily find their way
to this town. A committee com-
posed of Mrs. H. C. Stephens,
Mrs. R. H. Currin and Mrs. W.
F. Cary was appointed to take
care of the work.

A suggestion was made that
the Estacada State Bank be
asked to consider the use of a
road map on the checks issued
hereafter. This would also cre-
ate interest in this community
by calling attention to the roads
leading into this part of Clack-
amas county. Wilbur Wade, J.

appointed to take this matter up
with the bank.

The president urged the club
to consider the need of working
on the suggested pamphlet for
the purpose of advertising Est-

was made and carried that the

some means of raising the neces-
sary funds.

School Funds Listed

Statements for the appropria-
tion for school funds of Clack-
amas county are being sent out
this week by Brenton Vedder,
county school superintendent.

From the state fund the app-
ropriation is \$22,002.24; elemen-
tary fund, \$42,635.02; county
fund, \$67,004.50, which is one
of the largest appropriations ever
made. The total of the three
three appropriations is \$131,641-
76.

Last year the state fund
amounted to \$21,173.42, and the
elementary fund was the same
as six months ago.

These appropriations are now
being mailed out to the various
school districts by County School
Superintendent Brenton Vedder.
