INDUSTRY SPELLS PROSPERITY

Business experts state that much general prosperity is ahead of our country at this time. The past year has marked the end of the business depression and the period of readjustment, as they see it. The time is at hand for a gradual climb up the ladder of prosperity. This they predict will be gradual, however, following an extended period of inactivity.

This renewal of activity comes because the country is ready for it. Everything seems to favor it and there appears to be little political interference to hold it back.

Plans are now under way to open many lines of industry which have been idle for some time due to many causes. This will mean the opening up of employment for many idle men and women. Industry alone makes for prosperity. Money in circulation makes work for others.

It seems that this long decline in employment began in 1923, but statistics show that an upturn began in July of last year and has been very slowly creeping upward since that time. Employment increased during the months of August and September 3 1/2 per cent and in October prior to the presidential election, when no one seemed able to predict for certain the political outcome, industrial employment gained a larger percentage of increase than it had in September.

It is usually expected that business activity will fall off during the months of November and December, but this year confidence has been slowly developing and with it business has been expanding with considerable speed.

With a longer tendency of money rates appears a great period of firmness. The stock markets have advanced since last summer nearly 30 average points. This is an indication of greater prosperity ahead with a gradual upward trend, increasing in speed as the time passes.

Training School For Nurses

The Corvallis General Hospital located in Corvallis, offers the only training school for nurses affiliated with a national educational institution, outside of Portland, in the state of Oregon. High school graduates or those having the equivalent of a high school education, 18 years of age possessing a high moral character are eligible for admission. College graduates will find themselves at the end of their course with a much wider field to choose from than those who have not enjoyed the advantages of a higher education. Probationers may enter in the spring or fall terms.

The course offered at the Corvallis General Hospital is a three year course including class work and lectures in physiology anatomy hygiene, sanitation, principles of nursing, chemistry, materia medica, food and dietetics, obstetrics, surgery, communicable diseases, children's diseases, mental and nervous diseases, and the history and ethics of nursing.

Miss Della Lofgren, R. N. is the superintendent of the nursing school.

The advantages of studying in Corvallis are the best to be had in Oregon. The nurses quarters are attractively furnished, and plans are now being completed for a nurses home in its own building. The privileges of the lectures and concerts which are brought to O. A. C. and the fine college library may be enjoyed by the probationers, and the general atmosphere of the town is refined and conducive to a high degree of mental effort. The O. A. C. pharmacy department conducts classes in the sciences and materia medica and the home economics department has charge of the food and dietetics work.

OBITUARY

Alice Francis Hoyt (Whitney) was born in Oberlin, Ohio, March 13, 1854, and departed this life at 8:25 P. M. Tuesday, December 30, 1924, aged 70 years, 9 months and 17 days.

The family moved to Fairbault, Minnesota, where Miss Alice Hoyt met Eugene Adelbert Whitney, with whom she was united in marriage on Thanksgiving day, November 29, 1883. Mr. and Mrs. Whitney moved to Fairview, Oregon, in 1901, where they resided most of the time until four years ago, when they came to Estacada, where they have since resided. Mrs. Whitney became a Christian in early life, and united with the Methodist Church in Fairbault, Minnesota. Later she transferred her membership to the Presbyterian Church of that place, and when they came to Oregon her membership was placed in the Presbyterian Church at Fairview.

Mrs. Whitney had been gradually failing for the past year. She had been failing quite rapidly the past month till the end came the last Tuesday in December, 1924.

One brother and one sister have preceded Mrs. Whitney in death. She leaves to mourn her loss, her devoted husband, one sister and two brothers. Her sister, Mrs. Nellie C. West, and brother, Elmer E. Hoyt both reside in Minnesota. Her other brother, Willis T. Hoyt, resides in southern Oregon.

The funeral service was held at the home. Miss Anna Dillon and Mrs. T. B. Young sang, "It Is Well With My Soul", and "Abide With Me." Mrs. Stone of Fairview, Oregon, an old time friend of Mrs. Whitney, sang "Jesus Savior Pilot Me."

Rev. Ira F. Rankin spoke of "The Journey of Death", from the text found in Job, 16:22: "When a few years are come, then I shall go the way whence I shall not return." He pointed out that death is a strange, unavoidable, solemn and solitary journey. Death is always pending. We know not when we shall be called, but we shall make this journey never to return. The Savior has promised to be with us in death if we go with him in life. "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I

will fear no evil for Thou art with me."

"Living or dying, Lord, I ask to be but Thine; My life in Thee, Thy life in me Make heaven for ever mine."

Interment was made in the Odd-fellows cemetery near Estacada, under the direction of Undertaker Joseph E. Gates.

DIES WHILE VISITING DAUGHTER

Mrs. Dolores E. Lowell died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Richard Githens, near Oregon City, December 30, 1924, after a short illness. Mrs. Lowell, who has resided in Honduras, Central America, for two years, came north to spend the holidays with her daughter. Shortly after her arrival she contracted pneumonia, which proved fatal.

She was a resident of Michigan for many years and was fifty-six years of age at the time of her death. She is survived a husband, W. D. Lowell, who was called here prior to her death, a daughter, Mrs. R. Githens, a mother, sister and two brothers who reside in Michigan.

The funeral was held January 1, 1925, at the Holman chapel in Oregon City, with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Estacada. The Rev. Caradoc Morgan, pastor of the Congregational church of Oregon City officiated.

Marriages That Led to Odd Relationships

Mysterious muddles sometimes arise out of second marriages. A Corsican girl married a man whose first wife was the sister of the girl's grandmother. This makes her her own mother's grand-aunt and her grandmother's sister-in-law. To her brother and sisters she is great-aunt. Finally, she is her own grand-niece. Her husband is the brother-in-law of his grand nephews and grand-nieces.

An elderly American became the grandfather of his six children, and his first wife's stepfather. He divorced his wife and married his mother-in-law. The widower who married in succession seven sisters contracted various relationships, says the Montreal Family Herald and Star. This man started by marrying the eldest of the sisters, and subsequently went right down the line. Finally he led the seventh and last sister to the altar.

Swing Plays Part in Hindu Religious Rites

One often finds in the near vicinity of a Hindu temple, says a writer in an Indian paper, two high stone pillars, sometimes 30 feet high, with a stone crosspiece, from which hang iron chains. These swings play an important part in the various festivals of the year, especially for the young people.

The very act of swinging on this sacred structure is pleasing to the deity of the temple, and when it is possible to combine both pleasure and worship, then it is not unnatural this form of exercise should be greatly appreciated. In certain seasons, especially the harvest season, the swing is in great demand, and religious ceremonies are performed by the priests of the temple. On the top bar of the swing it is not unusual to find a number of earthenware chattels, which are the home of the sacred pigeons connected with the temple.

These swings are often built in the middle of the street, and they not infrequently constitute a real obstacle to traffic. But the authorities would certainly have great difficulty in persuading the temple people to agree to the removal of them.

Death in Triumph

Edouard Remenyi was a famous Hungarian violinist who made several world tours and settled in New York for some years. He died of apoplexy on the stage of the Orpheum theater, San Francisco, on May 15, 1898. This was his first appearance on the vaudeville stage and he was enthusiastically received on playing two or three classical pieces. He responded with "Old Glory," which created tremendous applause. Then he commenced to play Debussy' "Fizicatti," but after a few measures he leaned over and then fell forward on his face, dead. It is interesting to know that at one time the composer, Brahms, traveled with Remenyi and acted as his accompanist.

Hard to Fit
