PURPOSE OF CONFERENCE

When the Agricultural Economic Conference was held last year at Corvallis it was for the purpose of actually aiding the farmers of Oregon. Many persons who had studied the subject of agriculture in this state have held the belief that agriculture to be a real success must have some definite directing and that up to this time it had been developed largely under natural conditions without due regard to the many factors that govern marketing; that this state was especially well suited to the growing of a wide and various number of staple crops; that since so much is grown so far away from the great markets we must plan on what can be raised to sell profitably and as the nation grows so the business of agriculture becomes more exacting and complex.

The conference was called for a two-fold purpose; first, to form an agricultural program for Oregon based upon a comprehensive study of production and marketing possibilities; and second, to coordinate the efforts of all essential agencies in putting the program into effect.

That council served as a beginning and the value of its findings by the various committees and by individual producers can only be determined by the efforts which have been made toward advancement.

The farmers of Clackamas County are to have the opportunity of attending a general conference in Oregon City, Tuesday and Wednesday, Jan. 27 and 28, which will afford all an opportunity who are interested in the advancement of this county along agricultural lines to become acquainted with the ideas and experiences of others who are working along these lines.

FORD NEWS

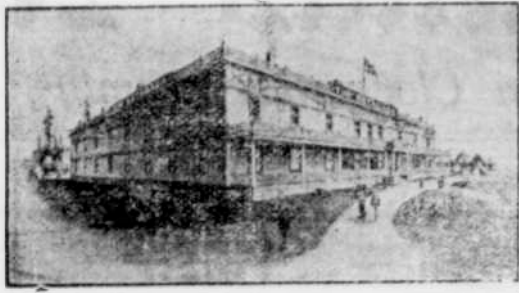
NEW YORK Jan. 3.—The Auto Show season, which formally opened here Friday, brought a new attraction to Broadway—a Ford final assembly line, in full action, producing new Ford cars at the rate of one every few minutes from 10 o'clock in the morning until 11 o'clock at night.

The famous old thoroughfare never saw anything like this before.

The curious began to wonder what was going on early in the week when cars were removed from the attractive and spacious show-rooms of the New York City branch of the Ford Motor Company on Broadway and Fifty-Fourth street. They wondered still more a day or so later when bright new fixtures and conveyor line began to take form in the room, and then Friday morning, curiosity gave way to amazement—Ford was building cars on Broadway.

Throngs began to gather outside the windows, inside along the line of operation to see and to marvel. They have been coming every day since in constantly increasing numbers. With the automotive industry celebrating its twenty-fifth anniversary, the Ford display is the unique and outstanding feature as typifying the progress made in motor car manufacture during the last quarter of a century.

In what might be termed a parlor, with conveyor lines, fixtures and

tools resplendent in nickel finish significant of the silver jubilee year of the industry, the Ford Motor Company is showing by actual assembly how high quality parts, produced by precision methods, can be quickly and easily assembled into complete cars and so make quality production possible.

Visitors, and they are coming by the thousands, marvel at the simplicity of it all as they pass along around the sixty-foot conveyor line where workmen in white uniforms assemble Ford cars almost before anyone realizes what is really happening.

From stocks of component parts, arranged in truck bins on the floor, the workmen begin the process of assembling the car with the fabrication of the frames and rear axle.

As these are completed they go to the final assembly line and building of the car starts on the conveyor, parts being added as it moves along. From an overhead hoist the motor is swung into place and a little further on the body is lowered and quickly bolted to the frame.

Four cars are in process of assembly on this conveyor all the time and it is surprising how quickly they are completed. As each car nears the end of the line the motor is started and it is driven off under its own power ready for delivery to the customer.

It is an interesting and educational presentation of what is transpiring for eight hours every day through the United States along final assembly lines in the thirty-two branches of the company which have a production capacity of 2,000,000 Ford cars and trucks annually.

INTERNAL REVENUE NEWS BULLETIN

PORTLAND—Blank forms for the use of individuals in reporting income for the year 1924 of \$5000, and less, derived from wages, salaries and commissions, were mailed January 2nd by Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, to every person who filed a return of income from the same source a year ago. Envelopes were addressed to 47,000 taxpayers.

Persons, any part of whose income for 1924 was derived from business or professions, farming, sales of property or rents, regardless of the amount, will be required to use a different blank. The use of this larger form will be required, also, in cases where the net income was in excess of \$5000, whether from salary, business, or other sources.

Forms for this class of taxpayers, also for corporations, partnerships and fiduciaries will be mailed as soon as a delayed shipment is received from Washington. Collector Huntley expects to complete the distribution of all income tax blanks within the next ten days. In view of the fact that every individual, firm and corporation that filed a return last year will be mailed blanks this year, he asks taxpayers to be patient for a few days pending the receipt of their blanks.

There is also available at Collector Huntley's office a supply of blank forms for the use of employees in reporting sales, wages and commissions of \$1000, or more, paid during 1924 to any employee or other person. In fact, all other necessary blanks incident to the preparation of income tax returns are available at the internal revenue office in the custom house.

Under the 1924 revenue act, returns of revenue must be filed by every single person whose net income last year was \$1000 or more, or whose gross income was \$5000 or more, and by every married couple whose joint net income was \$2500 or more, or whose income was \$5000 or more. Married persons not living together, such as divorcees or persons separated by mutual consent, are classed as single persons, as are widows and widowers.

There is no change in the exemption for a single person, which is \$1000. Married persons, living together, and heads of families, are allowed an exemption of \$2500, regardless of the amount of their net income. In addition to his personal exemption, the taxpayer is also allowed a credit of \$400 for each dependent but this credit cannot be claimed for the husband or the wife, though one may be totally dependent upon the other.

The nominal tax rates under the 1924 act are 2 per cent on the first \$4000 of net income in excess of the personal exemption and credit for dependents, 4 per cent on the next \$4000 and 6 per cent on the balance. The surtax rates range from 1 per cent on net incomes between \$10,000 and \$14,000 to 40 per cent on net incomes in excess of \$500,000.

Taxpayers may file their returns immediately and pay their tax in full, or they may avail themselves of that provision of the law which permits them to pay the tax in four equal quarterly installments. Returns, accompanied by the payment of at least one-fourth the total tax, must be filed with Collector Huntley not later than March 15. Taxpayers will find it to their advantage to file returns early for by calling at Collector Huntley's office they can have the assistance of experienced deputies in preparing their statements of income.

FARM REMINDERS

Red alsike or white clover seed is the best cash crop on Oregon irrigated and on western Oregon farms, advises the O. A. C. experiment station. The yield is from 300 to 600 pounds of seed per acre. As annual imports run 16 million pounds, there is no immediate danger of over-production. Rotate clover with wheat or barley and get more grain per acre, but plant no buckhorn, sorrel or dodder.

Folks who want summer pasture for hogs can plant Dwarf Essex rape at about 5 pounds an acre in April, May or early June, and have a good hog pasture in six to eight weeks after the seed is planted, says the state college experiment station. The later plantings if the soil has been prepared early, usually make a good deal of excellent summer pasture.

A few grains of salt added to cocoa bring out the flavor.

Cranberries may be candied cheaply by boiling them carefully in a thick syrup. They can be used in place of the more expensive candied cherries for decoration of cakes.

Marshmallow flowers for cake decoration are made by clipping Marshmallows into long pieces and arranging them to represent petals. A bit of candied cherry or gumdrop may be used for the centers.

Candied cherries make pretty candle holders for birthday cakes, suggests the household science department.

If the skin of cranberries is disliked, the berries may be put thru the meat grinder before cooking.
