AGRICULTURAL ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

Uniting all forces in the county, both agricultural and commercial, the agricultural economic conference scheduled for Clackamas county should bring far-reaching results. That such a conference should be held was the decision of representatives of various county organizations which met at the county seat recently. According to present plans this will be the biggest event of an agricultural nature yet attempted in this county.

A year ago a state conference was held at Corvallis. At that time there was made a study of the state's agriculture from the economic standpoint. A very comprehensive program of agricultural development came from the deliberations of the 540 delegates who attended from all over the state. Since that time ten counties of the state have held similar conferences and have developed similar programs. A careful study is made of the leading types of farming with a view to a closer understanding of the problems of economical production and profitable marketing. And, too, all forces of the county are brought together on a unified program for the general betterment of the county.

The general committee is made Grange, Farm Bureau, Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers, County Bankers' Associations, Clackamas County Canning Association, Creamery interests, the county dairy association, and the Pacific Co-operative wool grower's Association. It was the opinion of the committee that there should be a better understanding among all these forces, each of which is working toward county advancement. It has the earmarks of a big, strong program which should surpass anything yet undertaken in the county.

Large committees are already at work studying the present status of local agriculture and examining information and data now available in order that all the facts having a bearing on the question may be available for use by the general conference. This information covers a wide range of subjects, a few of which are the advisability of increasing or diminishing the output of certain products, cost of production, what may be done to improve our markets, standardization in many lines. The O. A. C. Extension Service is working with the committees in gathering all possible information of a local as well as world wide nature, having to do with the proper condition of the various subjects.

The following persons from the Estacada district have been appointed to act on various committees:

M. C. Glover, chairman farm crops committee; Ed. Shearer, on farm crops committee; C. B. Sprague, Logan, dairy committee; A. W. Botkin, H. B. Davis, T. J. Raegan, on horticulture committee.

The general conference will be held on January 27 and 28, at Oregon City, the daily sessions commencing at 10 A. M. Everybody interested in the advancement of the county is invited to attend.
