Richard F. Grant, president of the United States chamber of Commerce, says: "The function of business is to provide the material necessities of mankind,—it is doing this, and more. Business today is rising to new heights; it has a conscience and a soul. Business today realizes that it must enter into the various community problems and it is helping to solve them. The hospitals, the research laboratories, the various other charities and scientific achievements are promoted and sponsored chiefly by business men. This is the answer to the oft-repeated charge that is sordid, is not on the level."

No Oregonian need go outside his own state to find safe, conservative interest-bearing investments. Several big Oregon public service corporations are extending their lines and interesting their customers to come in as fellow-capitalists in developing the state; and their rate of interest are as attractive as their solidity is assured. Every dollar spent to extend these home industries adds to the value of every home, every farm acre, every business stand; besides paying its normal per cent interest.

Who else is one-half as much interested in Oregon as Oregonians themselves? Who else has the Oregonian's faith in the resources here? Who should reap the reward of development and courage, but Oregonians?

A rapidly growing number of Oregon towns found it expedient to let go of their little, insignificant electric light and power plants, and received the better, cheaper service of the big service companies. The Portland Electric Power Company alone serves nearly sixty communities; and the plan of customer ownership through local purchase of company securities is making this and other public service companies indispensable local institutions.

If there is a local industry that a little capital might help put over, this is a good year to give it a lift.

The railways are entitled to a "legislative holiday". All signs indicate there was never a better time for such a truce.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

To said Theresa Johnson, sometimes known as Theresa Johnston, and to H. P. Furlong: You are hereby required to appear in the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Clackamas on or before the 4th day of March, 1925, and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit or the plaintiffs will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in the Complaint, to-wit: Quieting the title to the following bounded and described real property, situate in the County of Clackamas and State of Oregon, to-wit:

Beginning 350 feet south of the quarter post between Sections 34 and 35, T. 2 S. R. 2 E. of W. M., in the center of the Abernethy road; thence by center line of said road N. 59 and one-fourth degrees W. 700 feet; thence N. 71 degrees W. 1000 feet; thence N. 65½ degrees W. 834 feet; thence N. 47½ degrees W. 450 feet to a post in the center of said road; thence south 2294 feet to a post; thence east 2640 feet to a post on Section line between sections 34 and 35, T. 2 S. R. 2 E. of W. M., thence north 970 feet to the place of beginning, containing 55.91 acres more or less, in them and declaring them to be the owners in fee simple of said premises and forever barring and enjoining you and each of you from exercising any right or ownership or claim in and to the said premises of any kind or nature whatsoever, and for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem equitable.

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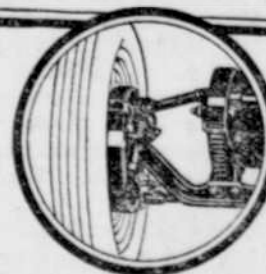
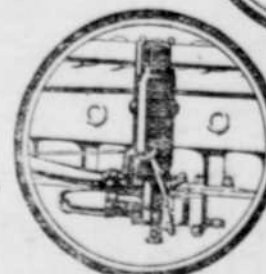
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
