LINCOLN

Even though an imposing monument has been erected to Lincoln's memory in the beautiful Springfield cemetery, his position is so secure in the hearts of men that such a thing, however imposing, can add but little to his renown.

Coming of humble parentage, reared amid privations and hardships, lacking social prestige and influential friends, Lincoln forced his way to the highest pinnacle of fame by sheer intellectual power, animated by a mighty purpose and consecrated to a great and worthy cause.

He was a statesman of the higher order, possessing an ability to analyze a complex situation and place his finger on the heart of the issue, unconfused by incidentals; and having determined the main issue, was able to abide by it, unmoved by any circumstances.

He was a great orator. His debate with Stephen A. Douglas, his speech at Cooper Institute, his address at Gettysburg, his second inaugural address—these have never been surpassed in their respective fields for greatness of thought, simplicity and purpose of diction, earnestness of purpose and wealth of sympathy.

He was one of the world's truly great men, great in intellect, in heart, in purpose, in sacrifice, in endeavor and in achievement.

His tragic death only added glory to his life, and the passing years have established his high position on the world's roll of honor.

"With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right," may well be used in the description of this noble character.

WORLD WAR VETS., NOTICE

Veterans of the World War who have not submitted applications for their bonuses are urged by Lt. Col. C. F. Andrews, city recruiting officer, U. S. A., to do so at once. The importance of applying at the earliest possible date is urged upon the veterans by Col. Andrews who states: "The war department is daily receiving cases in which veterans who thought themselves in the best of health have died or have been killed by accident without having submitted their applications for adjusted compensation. Their widows and children, many of them in needy circumstances, receive in such cases cash to the amount of the adjusted credit, an amount equal to approximately one-third only of that he would have received in one payment in cash had the veteran made application prior to death. For instance, should a veteran who served over seas for a period entitling him to the maximum amount of adjusted service credit of \$825, died without filing his application, his widow, children, or other dependent within the restricted claims, will receive that amount only in ten quarterly installments while if he filed his application prior to his death the widow, children, or dependent will receive approximately \$1580 in one payment in cash. Cash payments under the Act become due on March 1, 1925, and payment will be delayed unless the veteran applies a sufficient time in advance of that date to enable the War department to properly pass on applications and transmit it to the Veterans Bureau. Veterans may obtain application blanks, have their finger prints taken, and be rendered other assistance in completing their applications at any army recruiting station in Oregon or Washington.

FORD NEWS

Detroit, Michigan.—The name "FORD" goes on 2,651,000 Ford car and truck parts every day, as a protection to car owners against counterfeit parts.

Trade-marking of Ford parts with the now familiar script began in 1914 when spurious parts first appeared. This trade marking was extended in 1916 when the markets were flooded with the counterfeits and today, putting the name Ford on genuine parts has become something of an industry itself.

Different standard parts into which the trade-mark is worked during manufacture now totals 351 from the seventy pound cylinder block to the quarter ounce switch key.

A special department employing eighteen skilled engravers is continually busy making the stamp dies, while scores of other workers are engaged throughout the Ford factories in making the parts.

In a majority of instances it has been found possible to incorporate the operation with manufacturing processes. Spring leaves are marked as the steel is rolled at the mills. Drop-forged and cold-headed steel parts are marked by stencils cut into the dies. Some of the parts, like the crankshafts, piston rings, and rear axle ring gear—because of the sequence of operations and precision required—are stamped in separate operations.

In the engineering department an average of 700 stamps and stencils of the Ford trade mark in various sizes are made daily.

This trade mark on genuine Ford parts not only assures the car owner

products that represent twenty-one years of study, research and work in developing the strongest materials and the most efficient designs, but also stands as a safeguard against the counterfeiter.
