**SURVEY FRUIT IND'S IN THIS LOCALITY**

ket, limited quantity or poor quality.

**Planting Program**  
Estacada can grow quality fruit, especially berries.  
More blackberries, strawberries, red raspberries, bartlett pears and cherries should be planted.  
The grower who takes an interest in some particular kind of fruit should plant more of it. It would be a mistake for every grower to plant all the fruit wanted as some of them would be favored and some neglected. If one likes the strawberry business he should increase his planting in this fruit and leave to someone else the planting of blackcaps or pears—but in any event a systematic campaign should be inaugurated to foster the planting in the Estacada district of more of these fruits in which the district is now short. Estacada should grow at least 50 tons of each of these fruits in order to make markets for them. Canneries are not ordinarily interested in lesser blocks. A hundred tons, or in round numbers, a hundred acres would make the district more attractive to outside buyers.  
If the Ettersburg 121 does well in this locality this variety might be planted as it is the chief canning variety, Clark, would do well. If so, it should be planted. A little experimentation is necessary. The Marshall or Oregon may be planted extensively for the barrel trade. There is a greater possibility of the darrrelling business being overdone than of the canning business.  
Bartlett pears should be planted in blocks of not less than 5 acres as a well planned spraying program is essential to success.  
Royal Anne cherries should do well and may be planted in almost any acreage from one tree up as little spraying is necessary.

**INCOME TAX IN A NUTSHELL**

**WHO?** Single persons who had net income of \$1000 or more, and married couples who had net income of \$2,500 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns.  
**WHEN?** The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1925.  
**WHERE?** Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.  
**HOW?** Instructions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.  
**WHAT?** Two per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions and credits. Four per cent normal tax on the next \$4,000. Six per cent normal tax on the balance of net income. Surtax on net income in excess of \$10,000.
