ADVERTISING OREGON

EVERY Oregonian should feel proud of the fact that this month his state is receiving nation-wide publicity thru the advertising campaign being carried on by the Northern Pacific, Chicago Burlington and Quincy and Great Northern Railways, with the aid of the Oregon Committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, co-operating with other public bodies.

Posters 18x24 inches will be placed in three thousand stations of these railroads during the month. Attractive menus will appear in every dining car on the Northern Pacific system. This menu itself is truly a work of art, reproducing Mt. Hood in four colors, featuring Oregon products, and making a direct appeal for new settlers, homeseekers and manufacturers to come to Oregon.

The land settlement committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce is furnishing the Oregon products which will be served in the dining cars and the menu will carry the district in which each was grown. The Northern Pacific Railroad will distribute 175,000 leaflets giving a brief summary of the attractions and opportunities offered by this state in their correspondence for the month and the other railroads will use about the same.

The March time table folder of these railroads will carry three full page advertisements and others of smaller size.

Radio talks featuring Oregon will reach an audience of millions. Motion pictures will be extensively shown in various eastern and middle-western cities.

Preparing for Oregon month, the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and the Burlington Railroads published two large advertisements on Oregon, the first appearing in twenty farm journals, reaching 21,116,847 readers with the story of farm opportunities in Oregon; the second appearing in fourteen national farm journals reaching 10,000,000 farm people. Many good prospects are already inquiring for more information about Oregon.

Oregon needs new people, new industries, new money, and especially needs an increase in the rural population.

By this extensive advertising campaign the advantages, opportunities and possibilities can best be placed before those interested in this way and will undoubtedly have an important bearing on the future of Oregon.

BORING BOY MEMBER O. A. C. GLEE CLUB

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 7.—Walter Schweider of Boring, sophomore in agriculture, is a member of the Glee club of O. A. C. that will tour through eastern Oregon during spring vacation. The singers will leave Corvallis March 21 in two buses chartered for the trip. Regular stops will be made in The Dalles, Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, Union, and Hood River where concerts and entertainments will be given.

Additional stops will be made at Hot Lake, Arlington, and Umatilla. At Hot Lake the club will have the use of the swimming pool and the hot mineral baths. In Arlington they will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce at its weekly luncheon.

Forty men are to make the trip this year—30 of the regular members of the club, an eight piece orchestra, and the director and the manager. The Glee club has made several trips of this kind to different parts of the state and on each occasion was well received.

NEW PIG RAISING CONTEST IN STATE FAIR NEXT FALL

The one-ton-litter pig growing contest for Oregon growers will be held at the Oregon state fair next fall for the first time. Rules and regulations have been outlined to make the contest as useful and interesting as possible, both to the growers and the public. Premiums are as follows:

First prize \$50, second \$40, third \$30, fourth \$20, and fifth \$10. The heaviest pig in any litter will also get a prize of \$10.

Any litter farrowing after March 1, 1925, and weighing not less than one ton September 29 is eligible to compete. This means any litter—pure bred, cross breed or grade. Growers wishing to enroll are to notify the animal industry department at the state college within 5 days after the litters have farrowed. Special blanks may be obtained either from the college or the county agent.

Awards will be made on the weights of the litters exhibited at the state fair, no award going to any litter on which either the adjusted weight or the official weight is less than one ton.

The litter may contain any number of animals and may contain sows, barrows and bores, but it is recommended that no bores be in the ton litter.

The pigs in the ton litter contest are eligible to enter in the regular classes contained in the state fair premium list.

Artificial pollination of green house tomatoes has been found to be very profitable. Greatly increased yields result as compared to tomatoes which have been left to take care of themselves. By writing to the Clerical Exchange, Corvallis, Oregon, experiment station circular showing the possibilities of this method will be sent.—Industrial Journalist, O. A. C.

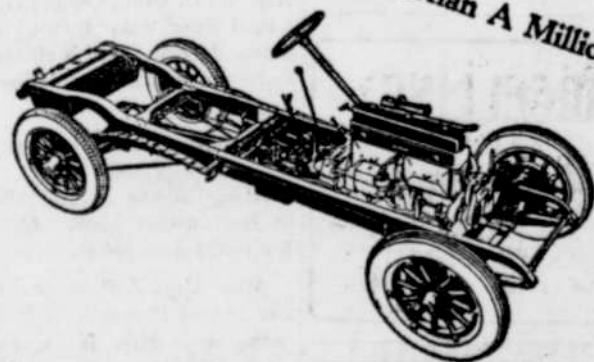
