OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

The work of extending the Umpqua
river jetty a distance of 1300 feet has
begun.

David R. Vandenberg, Portland at-
torney, was appointed deputy district
attorney of Klamath county.

June 5 and 6 are the dates for the
33d annual picnic of the Umatilla
County Pioneers' association.

It has been decided to transfer the
state prohibition department head-
quarters from Portland to Salem.

Trustees of the Columbia Basin Ir-
rigation league will meet in Portland
March 27 to outline the summer and
fall activities of the league.

Thirty-four fires caused a loss of
\$76,586.06 in the city of Portland last
month, according to the report of Ed-
ward Grenfell, fire marshal.

A complete survey of the city of
Roseburg to determine any areas not
afforded suitable fire protection has
been ordered by the city council.

There is more influenza in the state
now than at any time all winter, Dr.
Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the
state board of health, reports.

Milton S. Woodcock, pioneer of Ben-
ton county, regent of the agricultural
college and president of the First Na-
tional bank of Corvallis, died at Cor-
vallis.

Swan Martin, transient, was killed in
the Southern Pacific railroad yards at
Salem when he fell under the
wheels of a train on which he was
stealing a ride.

Delegates from all parts of the state
attended the three-day annual con-
vention at Astoria of the state organ-
ization of the Daughters of the Amer-
ican Revolution.

Frank E. Lynn of Perrydale, Polk
county, was reappointed a member of
the Oregon state fair board for a
term of four years. His first term
expired on March 14.

Three thousand men will be at work
on the Southern Pacific company's
new line over the summit of the Cas-
cades between Eugene and Klamath
Falls within a few weeks.

Goat shearing is making good pro-
gress in the Willamette valley and
most of the mohair buyers are now out
with offers of 55 cents for mature
hair and 75 cents for kid hair.

T. A. Rinehart, for the last two
years secretary of the state tax com-
mission, has submitted his resigna-
tion, to become effective April 1. He
will be succeeded by Ralph Wirth.

Activities of the state traffic offi-
cers resulted in 175 arrests during
February, according to a report pre-
pared by T. A. Raffety, chief inspector
for the state motor vehicle depart-
ment.

FORD NEWS STORY

Detroit, Mich., March 1925.—In-
creasing demand for closed cars
among other things, is furnishing the
textile industry of the country with
a big and annually growing busi-
ness.

The largest user of upholstery
materials is the Ford Motor Com-
pany and figures which have just
been given out by the company not
only show how the closed car popu-
larity is growing, but also present
an interesting picture of the great
quantity of cloth used in trimming
automobile bodies. Ford production
records disclose that in 1924 close
to 40 per cent of the company's
passenger car output was closed
cars, which is a new high record.
To trim these cars it took approxi-
mately 3,680,000 yards of cloth,
the equivalent of the entire annual
output of ten mills of twenty-five
looms each.

Another thing, it required the
fleece of more than 875,000 sheep
to furnish sufficient wool for all this
cloth, and an interesting feature in
this connection is that within the
last two years the price of wool,
such as used in Ford upholstery, has
more than doubled. However, man-
ufacturing economies effected in
other departments permitted the
company to each year lower the
price of Ford closed cars to the pur-
chaser.

Buyers for the company start
with the fleece, specifying in detail
the exact kind of wool to be used.
The quality most desirable was de-
termined upon only after much ex-
perimental work and long and severe
tests. As Ford cars are for the most
part subject to long and hard ser-
vice, it is necessary to provide in
the upholstery cloth not only
pleasing and attractive appearance
but also unusual wearing qualities.

EAST OREGON'S SONS TURN COWBOY STARS

Hoot Gibson of "Ridin' Kid From

Eastern Oregon, while it has not
gained the romantic fame as a cattle
