FORD SALES SHOW HEAVY INCREASE

Detroit, Michigan, March, 1925—Spring business is opening up most promisingly and the outlook is for rapidly increasing activity, according to sales reports of the Ford Motor Company just received here.

In the sale of Ford cars and trucks these show that daily domestic retail deliveries have more than doubled since early in January.

Another interesting feature is shown in the sale of Fordson Tractors which have made a rapid gain, particularly through the agricultural sections, indicating that the farmer is coming in stronger as a buying factor.

Retail sales of the company during February, exclusive of those in Canada and British possessions served by the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd., totaled 125,421 Ford cars and trucks and 7,211 Fordson Tractors.

Reports also indicate improving conditions in the high priced car field. Lincoln cars, set a new February record with 508 domestic retail deliveries as compared with 426 for the same month a year ago.

OBITUARY

G. A. Lovell, late of Currinsville, Oregon, died March 26, 1925 at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland at the age of 64 years, from complications following an attack of influenza.

Mr. Lovell was born in River Falls, Wisconsin, December 18, 1860. At the age of 26 he moved to North Dakota where a year later he was united in marriage to Rose Hicker-son, who survives him. Five children were born to this union, being Earl C., Noel C., and Irvle Lovell of North Dakota, Mrs. Elva Kitching of Currinsville and Maye Lovell of Portland. The following sisters and brothers also survive, Mrs. Kate Wilcox of Eckman, North Dakota; Melinda Elliott of River Falls, Wisconsin; Mrs. Ada Wilcox of Clayton, Wisconsin; Mrs. Maude Harlen and C. R. Lovell of Currinsville, Ore., and Edwin Lovell of Long Beach, California.

He had been a resident of Currinsville for nearly ten years and in this time had made many friends who were grieved to hear of his passing.

The funeral services were held at the Miller and Tracy chapel in Portland, Saturday, March 28th, at 1 P. M., with Rev. Ira F. Rankin of this city officiating. Interment was made in Riverview cemetery, Portland, under the auspices of the Masonic order of Estacada. Past Master J. Greenwood officiated at these services.

The pall bearers were R. Thomas Carter, Roy Wilcox, G. P. Rose, J. C. Moreland, Harry Kitching and H. C. Stephens.

Mr. Lovell had been an especially active member in the Masonic lodge here and was the first member to subscribe to the fund created for the erection of the present Masonic building. A large delegation was in attendance from this order and the floral tributes were many.
