NOTICE OF CONTEST.

(For Publication)

Department of the Interior, United States Land Office, Portland, Oregon, March 18th, 1925.

To heirs of John H. Walker, deceased, of Estacada, Oregon, Contestees:

You are hereby notified that Robert Casey, who gives 2087 East Madison St. Portland, Oregon, as his post-office address, did on March 2nd, 1925, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of Homestead Entry No. 07292, Serial No. 07292 made June 29th, 1922, by John H. Walker, now deceased, for NW 1/4 of NE 1/4, Section 31, Township 3 South, Range 5 East, Willamette, Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said John H. Walker died in the State of Oregon on the 31st day of August, 1924; that at the time of his death he was not engaged in the military or naval service of the United States during any war in which the United States was engaged; that since he made said entry on June 29th, 1922, he had not been engaged or employed in the military or naval service of the United States; that he never made settlement on said land or resided thereon before he made said entry; that he did not reside upon said land long enough to entitle him to a patent for said land, and his default therein was not due to his employment in the military or naval service of the United States; that his heirs are unknown and their places of residence are unknown to contestant and after due and diligent inquiry said heirs or their places of residence cannot be found by him; that none of said heirs have ever resided on said land or improved or cultivated any part thereof, and they have wholly abandoned said land for more than six months immediately preceding the beginning of this contest; that more than six months have elapsed since the death of said entryman; that the absence of said heirs from said land and their failure to improve or cultivate said land is not and was not due to their employment in the army

or navy of the United States during any war in which the United States has been engaged; said entryman was unmarried at the time of his death.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be canceled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

You should state in your answer the name of the postoffice to which you desire further notices to be sent to you.

STAR CLIMBS STEEP GRADES

OAKLAND, March, 1925--Prior to an attempt made a few days ago by a Star Touring car, available records showed only two cars, both much higher powered, and one driven by a veteran of the race tracks, that had ever succeeded in climbing the Camp Baldy Road, starting from the Foothill Boulevard just outside Pomona, in Southern California, and on up to the famous resort.

According to word received at the Durant Motor Company here, the Star touring car has conquered these grades practically without an effort.

The road is known as one of the most deceptive hills in the state. The Star was a stock model, and the event was officially witnessed by an observation party from Pomona, under Chief of Police A. W. Lyter of Pomona, and formed by three photographers, three newspaper men, and a dozen automobile men.

Starting the Camp Baldy grade, the first obstacle is a three mile straightaway, on which the grades average from three to five per cent, small grade. However, this proves the downfall of practically any car, for because of the long steady pull, practically every car trying the hill boil in the attempt, and so is in no condition to tackle the grades that are better than 12 per cent throughout the climb proper.

The Star car was driven by a "rank amateur," E. B. Ross, sales manager of Star car sales for Woodworth Brothers. Chief Lyter removed the gear shift lever, after the high gear was placed in mesh, and retained the shifting bar in his possession until he checked the Star in at the summit.

The victorious car was then driven down the grade, and on the straightaway proved conclusively by maintained high speed that it was of standard gear ratio.

In Southern California this climb, coming on the heels of the now famous Waterman Canyon climb, has attracted wide attention.
