CLOVER SUCCEEDS BEST WHEN PLANTED ALONE

Red and Alsake clover planted alone will be more successful in establishing a stand. Although indications from the dealers and the experiment station at Corvallis show a short acreage of clover for 1925, seed dealers indicate a rather slow demand for clover seed this spring. Because of the unusually few numbers of inquiries at the station, it seems to indicate that the farmers do not figure on planting clover this spring. Last year the clover crop was short and the clover crop for 1925 is going to be short because of the dry summer of 1924 which killed most of the clover seeding. It is cheaper for the farmer to grow his own hay which should be a legume and not a grain, grass and weed hay. Good quality hay is cheaper to feed than poor quality which takes more for feeding.

Plant the land early in the spring and cultivate until planting to kill the weeds and maintain a good mulch. The late workings of the land should be shallow to avoid bringing up more weed seeds. Plant 12 pounds of red clover or the corrugated roller, if the surface from the middle of April to the middle of May. Drill it in if suitable machinery is available, which will seed about one inch in depth, or broadcast by hand. Cover the seed by harrowing lightly or using the corrugated roller, if the surface is dry.

High Scouring Butter Need

"If Oregon and the other northwest states are to succeed in selling the surplus butter already reaching large proportions, it must produce a higher scoring produce," says P. M. Brandt, professor of dairy husbandry at the state agricultural college. "We must be able to sell in California and other markets in competition with the superior grades of butter produced in the great dairy states of Minnesota and Wisconsin, and that is now being imported from New Zealand and Australia in spite of a tariff of 8 cents per pound.

FARM REMINDERS

Grimm Alfalfa Hardy

Plantings of Grimm alfalfa in Morrow county withstood the cold winter far better than the common variety, according to a survey made recently by R. W. Morse, county agent. He says that Grimmsowed by I. Skovbo of Boardman a year ago was not damaged while common alfalfa all around it was nipped. Garnet Barat of Hoppner reports that Grimm he seeds two years ago is the only alfalfa left on his place. Many other growers report similar comparisons, according to Morse.

Grimm is the variety recommended by the state and county agricultural economic conferences because as compared with other varieties it lives longer, resists cold better, starts earlier in the spring and yields more hay to the acre.

Chicks Want Free Range

Brooding chicks on clean soil and giving them free range following the brooding period is a wise practice, according to H. E. Cosby, poultry specialist of the O. A. C. extension service. A two, three or four yard system with the permanent brooder will permit ranging chicks on clean ground each year and will go far toward avoiding diseases that result from soil contamination, says Cosby. He asserts that brooding a large number of chicks on the same ground year after year and raising them to laying age on the same ground used for brooding is about the surest known method of going out of the chicken business.

Early plowing Helps

Willamette valley fruit plantings that are plowed and worked by the middle of April will conserve more moisture than those left unplowed after that date, says C. L. Long, hor-
