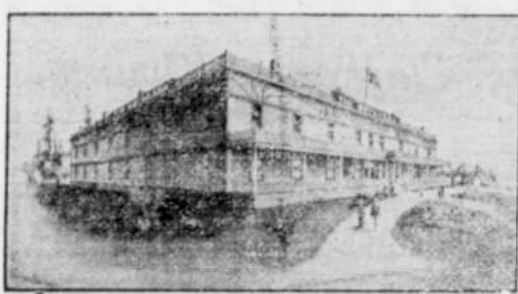

DEPUTY SHERIFF FINDS BODY NEAR ESTACADA

Deputy Sheriff James Norris made a gruesome find last Sunday afternoon in the woods at the lower end of the park when he came onto the body of a man, later identified as that of Pat O'Connor, aged 55 years, who had apparently hung himself by a light cord to a tree. The cord had broken and the body was found in a crouching position as tho it had dropped there shortly after death.

From the surroundings it is supposed he had partaken heavily of "bootleg" liquor.
About fifteen dollars in cash was found on his person, a certificate of deposit showing \$100, and various other papers were found. The coroner was immediately notified and came to investigate the case and removed the body to Oregon City.

He was known by a number of residents in this section, having been a resident of Viola.

THE I. O. O. F. LODGE HOLDS ANNIVERSARY

Last Saturday evening the members of the I. O. O. F. lodge held a meeting in their hall to commemorate the 106th anniversary of Oddfellowship in America.

This order was first instituted in England in the 18th century and consists of lodges, encampments, Grand lodges, Grand encampments and Sovereign Grand lodges of the world. It assumed its present form at a convention in Manchester in 1813 and has since spread widely in Great Britain and elsewhere.

The prime requisite for membership is good moral character and belief in the Supreme Being.

This order has been very prosperous in the United States, the first lodge having been organized in Baltimore, April 26, 1819, becoming in 1825, the Grand Lodge of the United States. The membership in this country is now 1,400,000, and the American system has become very popular in France, Germany, Switzerland, Holland, Sweden, Denmark and various other countries. The amount paid for the relief of members, burial of the dead, etc., is over \$5,000,000 annually.

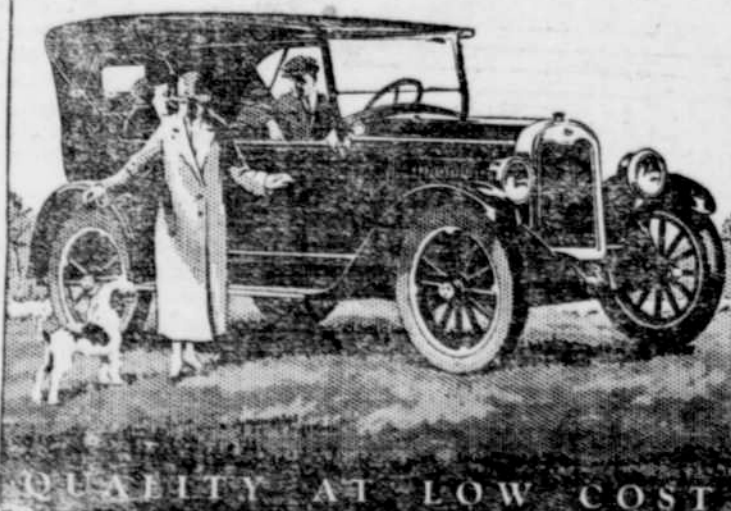
