TOTAL FOREST FIRE LOSS \$500,000,000 EACH YEAR

While the Forest Service places the annual timber loss through forest fires at an average of \$18,000,000, E. T. Allen, Forester of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, puts the annual merchantable timber loss at \$25,000,000, but in addition he estimates the potential value of unmerchantable young trees destroyed each year at \$75,000,000, making the total average timber loss \$100,000,000. But that is only one-fifth of the ultimate loss of market for labor and supplies that vanishes forever with the destruction of \$100,000,000 (actual or potential value) is placed at \$400,000,000. These items take no account of soil destruction, erosion, flood damage, diminution of public revenues, and injury to business and contiguous property.

"Fire Prevention," says Mr. Allen, "has been said to be nine-tenths of forestry. If this be true, nine-tenths of our effort, and more, ought to be centered upon the definite task of arousing the American people to fire-consciousness. Not fires but the owner of the hand that sets them is the public's enemy. The problem, therefore, is not a fire hunt, but a man hunt."

It is not difficult for anyone to be careful with fire while in wooded areas. Here are simple:

1. Tobacco—Be sure that pipe toward reducing the appalling number of man-caused forest fires reported every year:
1. Matches—Be sure your match is out. Break it in two before you throw it away.
2. Tobacco—Be sure that pipe ashes and cigar or cigarette stubs are dead before throwing them away. Never throw them into brush, leaves or needles.
3. Making Camp—Before building a fire scrape away all inflammable material from a spot 5 feet in diameter. Dig a hole in the center and in it build your camp fire. Keep your fire small. Never build it against trees or logs or near brush.
4. Breaking Camp—Never break camp until your fire is out—dead out.
5. Brush Burning—Never burn slash or brush in windy weather or while there is the slightest danger the fire will get away.
6. How to Put Out a Camp Fire—Stir the coals while soaking them with water. Turn small sticks and drench them both sides. Wet the ground around the fire. If you can't get water stir in dirt and tread it down until
