OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

The tenth annual convention of the
Oregon Music Teachers' association
was held in Portland.

The 18th annual convention of the
Oregon Retail Jewelers' association
convened in Salem Monday.

Opening of the Spokane, Portland
& Seattle Railway company's new sta-
tion was celebrated at Astoria.

Estacada will hold a special elec-
tion May 29 to decide the question of
the annexation of more territory.

Voters of Cascade Locks voted
unanimously to authorize a \$20,000
bond issue for a high school building.

Dates for the sixth annual session
of the Pendleton summer normal
school will be from June 22 until
July 24.

Eugene's postoffice receipts for
April amounted to \$10,574.06, an in-
crease of about 15 per cent over
April, 1924.

The annual session of group 2, Ore-
gon Bankers' association, has been
set for May 22, afternoon and evening,
at Woodburn.

Joseph B. Hill, well known resident
of Lane county, died suddenly at his
home near Eugene, where he was
born 65 years ago.

Dr. Carl Doney, president of Wil-
lamette university, arrived at Salem
Saturday after spending a year in the
east recuperating from illness.

A two-day state convence of the De
Molay order convened in Medford
Friday with approximately 200 dele-
gates and other members present.

Oregon has one of the lowest in-
fant death rates in the United States,
according to Dr. Frederick D. Stricker,
secretary of the state board of health.

In an effort to lessen the number of
deaths by drowning each summer, the
Klamath Falls American Legion post
voted to purchase a pulmotor for the
city.

After having been shut down since
December 18 as the result of a fire,
the plant of the Portland Vegetable
Oil Mills company has resumed opera-
tions.

Oregon Trunk surveyors who will
lay out two proposed lines from Bend
to Klamath Falls arrived in Bend Sat-
urday and left immediately for the in-
terior.

F. H. McGowan, 65, picked up from
the highway by a stage near Deer
Island, where he was found apparently
ill, died shortly after being taken to
Rainier.

Work has again been started on
the Cohen mine near Gold Hill. In
the '70s this mine was a large gold
producer, but has been inactive for
some years.

Work on the 17.3-mile stretch of
The Dalles-California highway from
Sand creek north, which is being built
by C. Nyberg, will be completed by
September 1.

Bankers from the eight northwest-
ern counties of Oregon gathered in
Astoria Friday for the annual spring
meeting of group 1 of the Oregon
Bankers' association.

The Hood River Apple Growers' as-
sociation was notified that an average
of \$4.26 a box had been received for
a carload of fancy Newtown apples
sold in New York city at auction.

R. H. Grefe, at present employed on
the Wenatchee national forest in
Washington, has been assigned to the
Cascade national forest as superin-
tendent of road and trail construc-
tion.

W. L. Glichrist of Albany was cut
in several places about the face and
hands near Halsey when a China
pheasant flew into the windshield of
Mr. Glichrist's car with such force as
to shatter the glass.

Walter Ford, 9, La Grande school
boy, was dangerously injured as the
result of boys playing with a pistol.
He was shot through the neck and
lost much blood before medical at-
tention was obtained.

State highway officials of Oregon
will meet with those of 10 other west-
ern states at San Francisco Friday to
designate the interstate roads in those
states to be uniformly marked as Uni-
ted States highways.

Ten were killed in traffic accidents
in Portland during the first four
months of 1925, an increase of three
over the corresponding period in 1924,
according to an announcement made
at police headquarters.

A total of 24,112 applications for
cash bonus and loans have been re-
ceived since the creation of the sol-
diers' relief act in 1921, according to
an announcement made at Salem by

TIME PASSES, CUSTOMS AND MANNERS CHANGE

The past century is not so far
away that many now living cannot
bring to mind the customs, the
questions of morality and proper
ways of conduct experienced in
those times as contrasted with the
changes at the present time. To
such as do not recall those days the
recital of an incident in the career
of a character in one of Charles
Dickens' best books may quite
clearly illustrate the moral stan-
dard in the days when the book
was written. A little lady called
Miss Mowcher, a manicurist, was
calling upon two gentlemen in the
course of plying her vocation, and
being of a very diminutive size
was obliged to stand on a table
to operate upon the gentleman's
fingers. Being assisted in this by
one of them and a chair, her first
concern upon reaching the table
was as to whether or not either
one or the other of her customers
had seen her ankles? and if they
had to say so, and she would im-
mediately go home and destroy her-
self. The novelist tells us Miss
Mowcher was assured by both gen-
tlemen that their eyes were guilt-
less, and the little lady thereupon
consented to live.

Now, those of more mature
years know that this picture of
those times was not overdrawn,
and no lady of that period could
suffer any greater chagrin and hu-
miliation of her modesty than that
her ankles should be exposed to
vulgar male observance. This
show of modesty was an evidence
of good breeding, and the result of
proper bringing up at home by a
mother who was herself a model to
pattern after. She realized and
inspired in her daughter the idea
of properly dressing herself in or-
der that no suggestiveness of evil
might form in the minds of those
whom her daily life brought her in
contact, and to be pure and modest
in all her actions.

Time passes and customs and
manners change. As purely a mat-
ter of health and sanitation, dresses
are shortened to a reasonable
length, without complaint that any
of the proprieties are trespassed.
Time again moves on bringing us
down to the present day where the
shortening process is still going on
and the former idea of dress and
morality is entirely lost sight of.
The auto, the movies, and other
diversions have drawn away from
church and Sunday school attend-
ance, almost if not quite wiping
out the old-fashioned, so-called, no-
tions of home and fireside and for-
mer beliefs of what is proper and
becoming. The mother instead of
giving her time and watchful care
and love to the rearing of her fam-
ily, gives herself up to cards, to
fallacious social functions, to dress-
ing herself unbecomingly, and pas-
sively allowing her daughter to do
the same, to pay no heed to her
comings and goings or concerning
where she is when not at home or
the class of company she may be
in. Indeed there seems a general
tendency on the part of mothers of
the day to give more attention to
her own pleasures than in maintain-
ing a proper mode of living herself,
and in neglecting all the duties in-
cumbent of a true motherhood.

The above will call forth pooh-
pooos and remarks of derision from
certain persons. But let these
look about and see what they see
and read from day to day of
young girls gone wrong, missing
and walking the thorny path. If
thesepersons and the mothers who
neglect their duties, their solemn
obligations to rightfully instruct,
train and send out into the world
the fruits of their womb to disgrace
and not to bless them, they cannot
escape the deep misery, that fright-
ful gnawing at the heartstrings
that will surely come as Time lays
his heavy hand on their heads.

ESTACADA COUNCIL EMPLOYS MARSHAL

The monthly meeting of the city
council was held in the city hall,
Tuesday, May 12, at 8 p. m., with
Mayor Stephens presiding and
Councilmen J. Lovelace, T. Morton,
J. Osborne answered roll call with
R. Wilcox coming in later.

The minutes of the last meeting
were read by Recorder Dale and
approved.

A report showing a balance of
about \$260 delinquent water rent
was presented to the council by the
recorder.

The following bills were present-
ed: A Sagner, lights, \$6.95; Estac-
ada Telephone and Telegraph Co.,
long distance calls, \$1.15; P. E. P.
Co., for lights, \$21.00; freight on
wooden pipe, \$13.05; Recorder
Dale, salary, \$15.00. A motion
was made by T. Morton, Seconded
by J. Osborne, that all bills passed
by the finance committee be or-
dered paid and warrants drawn for
the same. Motion carried.

Various matters of discussion
were brought up by the members
present.

A motion made by J. Osborne,
seconded by T. Morton, that Jas.
Norris be employed as city mar-
shal at \$100 per month carried. It
is understood that the duties of
this marshal will be to do regular
work on anything that the city
council may see fit to have done.
Much work is needed on the present
water system, roads, and the dump-
ing ground has to be covered.

Sylvester Lawrence, commander
of the Carl Douglass Post, Ameri-
can Legion, was present and re-
quested the use of the city for the
celebration which that organization
will stage on Independence Day.
He briefly outlined to the council
the plans as formulated by the Le-
gion for this celebration and asked
their cooperation in all matters
pertaining to it.

A motion made by J. Osborne,
seconded by R. Wilcox, that the
city allow the Legion the use of the
entire city for this celebration, car-
ried.

Motion made by J. Lovelace that
the meeting adjourn was carried.
