CONDITION OF MAIL ROUTES

After a trip of inspection over the three rural routes leaving the Estacada post office, Postmaster A. N. Johnson found that there are portions on all three routes which are badly in need of repair. According to the statement of various patrons on the many routes much work is needed to "make the roads passable and safe" for the rural carriers who must travel over them at all times. Since the government has increased the maintenance of a rural carrier 4 cents per mile per day they naturally expect that the rural communities served by these carriers will cooperate in improving the road conditions.

A mail route is one of the really indispensable institutions of any community and we understand that if the Postal department at Washington, D. C., should condemn a road as impassable and unsafe they can prohibit the carrying of the mail over such a route. This is the time of the year to make plans for the improvement of these bad places before the stormy weather of the fall and winter sets in.

INTERESTING CHEV. NEWS

One employee in every six in the motor assembly plant of the Chevrolet Motor Company plant at Flint, Michigan, does nothing but check the rigid standards required in the motor parts and the accuracy with which they are fitted together.

There are 2,776 employees in the motor plant. Of these, 463 are inspectors who demand a precision too minute for detection by the unaided eye.

Before the engine block starts down one of the assembly lines it is given a triple inspection for possible irregularities or defects, each inspector checking his predecessor. Next it is washed and dried under compressed air and again inspected for cleanliness. If a dirt spot is discovered, the casting is sent back to the washer.

Almost endless tests mark its progress down the assembly line, precision being gauged down to one-thousandth of an inch. The moment an inspector detects any variation from standard, the motor is taken from the line. If the defect is only minor, the motor is sent back on the line for adjustments or replacements subject to subsequent re-inspection. If the variation from standard is fundamental, the motor is disassembled.

As the motor is built up, all parts and fittings are subjected to constant examination and re-examination. Precision is law. For instance, the fit of piston pins into the piston must be so exact that the pin may be pushed into the piston hole by the mechanic's thumb but will not fall out of its own weight. The clearance at this point is about one-twentieth the diameter of the finest human hair. This is called a "push in" pin.

After being built up, the motor is "run in" by electric motors at 1,200 revolutions per minute for about two hours to work in the bearings and pistons rings.

The motor is then "taken down" for inspection of the bearings, cylinder walls and all moving parts. When it passes the inspectors, it is reassembled and operated under its own power while experts listen for any possible noise, their methods being comparable to a doctor's use of a stethoscope.

If the motor sounds "sweet," it is returned to the assembly line for final equipment and painting. The last man on the line is an inspector. From his hands the motor goes to the various car assembly lines. From the Chevrolet Motor Co.

WHAT THE AMERICAN LEGION IS DOING FOR CHILDREN OF VETERANS

Portland.—(Special)—Due to the alertness of officials of the American Legion of Oregon, the son of a veteran who was killed overseas was last week saved from the stigma of serving a term in the State Reform school and instead enrolled as a student of the Oregon Military Academy. Leaving the family fire-side through the aversion to a step-father and threatened with commitment to the State Reformatory on the charge of incorrigibility preferred by his parents, the son of a former service man of Klamath Falls, who had fallen on Flanders Field in defense of his Country's Cause was rescued from his pitiful plight through the vigilance and efforts of Klamath Post No. 8, American Legion, and officers of the department of Oregon at Portland. By stories gathered by Legion officers, the lad, 13, bright and precocious for his years, simply reverts and worships the memory of his father, who was killed in the World War and when a step-dad came into the family to fill the place of a father "who gave the most" for his country, the son became fretful and discontented. Klamath Post heard of the boy's predicament and believing that he was not a proper subject for the reform school, petitioned the County Court to send him to the Beaverton home until such time as he could be taken care of thru the operation of the Endowment Fund. Consent of the court having been obtained, the boy was placed in the Beaverton institution but he remained there only a short while, when with two other boys, he ran away. He was caught at Woodburn and taken to Salem where Legion officers again became active and due to the efforts of J. W. Valiant, State service officer, Carl R. Moser, State Adjutant and W. R. Canton, Service Officer of Klamath Post, the boy was enrolled as a student at the Oregon Military Academy through special arrangements with that institution. Torged out in the regulation uniform of the school, which kindly State Legion officials had provided, this exiled orphan of a veteran in colors that reminded him of those his daddy wore when fighting in the trenches of Europe, stepped forth from state headquarters of the Legion, his face radiant with smiles as he thought of entering the academy where proper training will fill him for useful citizenship in his home state. Word has been received from Klamath Post that as a result of that activity by the Legion "a man who has always for the Legion made his bonus payable to the

Endowment Fund," just goes to show what the American Legion is doing for children of veterans who made the Supreme Sacrifice", commented J. W. Valiant, as he started from Headquarters to accompany this war orphan to happy environs in the Oregon Military school.

CARE IN ADDRESSING MAIL

Because of the increasing number of pieces of mail which are insufficiently, incorrectly, and illegibly addressed, this notice is published as a caution to mailers to exercise greater care in this particular.

During the year 1922 there were 200,000,000 pieces of such mail deposited in the postoffices of the country, of which 17,000,000 pieces reached the Dead Letter Office, and in this Dead Letter mail thus poorly or insufficiently addressed were found more than \$100,000 in cash.

In preparing any matter for mailing, the following directions should be observed:

Addressing mail

1. Print or write the complete name, postoffice, street, route and number. In any event write the most complete address available.

2. Avoid abbreviations which may be confusing or misleading, such as Cal., often mistaken for

OBITUARY

Margaret Jane, daughter of Pleasant and Mary E. Judd, deceased was born near Terre Haute, Putnam county, Missouri, January 3, 1859, where she lived until 1865, when she crossed the plains with her parents who came to Oregon and located near Eagle Creek. She was united in marriage to John F. Douglas, November 19, 1876, and they have resided at their home near Eagle Creek ever since. Mrs. Douglas united with the Methodist church when she was twenty-one years of age.

She had a slight stroke of paralysis February 25th, and later she contracted pneumonia which resulted in her death on May 7th, 1925, age 66 years 4 months and 4 days.

She leaves to mourn their loss, her husband, John F.; two daughters, Mrs. Melinda Hoffmeister of Eagle Creek, and Julia Richie of Boring; three sons, Wiley F., Pleasant, and Ernest of Eagle Creek. Also fourteen grand children and three great grand children of Eagle Creek; one brother, George W. Judd of Eagle Creek; and one sister, Clementine Hall of Damascus; besides a host of friends and relatives.

Funeral services were held from the Eagle Creek church at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, May 10th, Rev. Ira F. Rankin of the Estacada Methodist church officiating. He spoke from the text found in II Timothy 1:5, of A Christian Mother's legacy of Self-Sacrifice, Love and Faith in God.

Interment was made in the Eagle Creek cemetery under the direction of J. E. Gates of Gresham.

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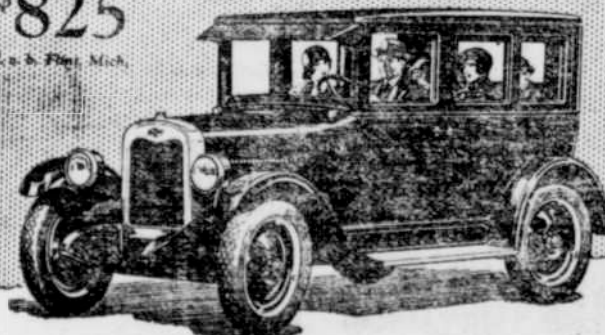


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
