A GREAT UNDERTAKING

The establishment of the Walter Hines Page School of International Relations at Johns Hopkins University is a sane and logical movement for the assurance of world peace backed by intelligence and an understanding of international problems.

"It is expected," says Dr. Frank J. Goodnow, president of Johns Hopkins, "that not only will the school itself through publication of its findings, make valuable contributions to existing knowledge of international relations, but that a trained body of investigators and teachers will be developed to carry on the work after they leave the school."

"With understanding will come release from the errors that give rise to unnecessary international friction and discord. As the motto of the Johns Hopkins University declares, veritas vos liberabit—the truth will set you free."

An endowment fund of \$1,000,000 which is necessary to provide the income to maintain this school is now being raised. It is the desire of the founders of the institution to secure this money, not from a few wealthy men, but from thousands of American citizens who wish to record their views in favor of intelligence in preference to ignorance in the settlement of any great world problem.

A young lady who is a stenographer in an office at Riverside, California, in sending in a dollar to help raise the necessary funds, wrote to Owen D. Young, president of the board of trustees of the Endowment Fund, 120 Broadway, New York:

"Please accept my check for \$1.00 as a contribution to the endowment fund of the Walter Hines Page School of International Relations. I cannot do less, but I wish that I could give more. I read your address on the Page School delivered at Johns Hopkins University. It came as a revelation to me, and I hope, from the bottom of my heart that one million Americans will be similarly affected."

A million \$1 subscriptions would be just about a million times more effective in establishing this school than one \$1,000,000 subscription. We should follow the lead of the young lady of Riverside and become founders of an institution which is destined to play a leading part in world affairs.—The Industrial News Bureau. PAYS SECOND QUARTERLY SIX PER CENT DIVIDEND

STATE MARKET AGENT DEPT.

The State Market Agent is notified by the Department of Agriculture of California that until September 30 of this year all shipments of potatoes from Oregon to California must be accompanied by certificates, stating where they were grown and shipped from, and in case of shipments grown in and shipped from Morrow, Umatilla and Union counties certificates must state that the potatoes were passed over a screen immediately prior to loading in the car, and placed in new or cleaned sacks. This order is made because of the potato beetle, of which sections of Oregon are said to be infected.

New Egg Grading Law

The last session of the state legislature passed an egg-grading law which will go into effect May 26, which is 90 days after adjournment.

The law provides that all eggs sold shall be divided into three classes. The first grade, "Fresh Standard," requires all eggs to weigh not less than 15-6 ounces, or 22 ounces to the pound; "Fresh Medium" not less than 17-12 ounces and not less than 19 ounces to the pound; "Fresh Undersized" (known as pewees) not less than 17-12 ounces and "Undergrades" which are culls.

The law requires that the carton or container shall be stenciled

with the grade of the eggs contained therein, in letters not less than one-third inches in height; when eggs are removed from original container and offered for sale in half cases or more, they shall be stamped "Not Canded" on the outside of the container in one inch high letters.

Commissioner J. D. Mickle of the Dairy and Food commission states that most of the eggs sold will come under the first two classes, and that the others will be consumed on the ranches. He advises producers and dealers to get scales and stamps and be ready to comply with the law when it goes into effect.

Dairying Should Not Increase

Should the number of milk cows increase in this country recovery in dairy product prices cannot be expected, states the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Whole milk sold and consumed last year was valued at \$1,714,000,000, compared with \$1,750,000,000 in 1923.

Co-Operative Law Stands

In one of the most sweeping of decisions the supreme court of Minnesota declared that the co-operative act of that state stands in every particular, and the court goes further and declares that liquidated damages for breaking a contract, are not adequate remedy; that the only adequate remedy is an injunction preventing any member from breaking his contracts, thus forcing delivery of his products to the association. This decision will have a far-reaching effect in preventing members of co-operative associations from being "bated" to break their contracts by outside concerns.

Law Grows in Favor

The new potato grading and inspection law is rapidly growing in favor, as the growers and dealers realize the benefits to those who are dealing in honest packs. Those who are opposed to the law are those who are not familiar with it, or those who would buy undesirable stock and sell it for No. 1. The state market agent states that enforcement is now being taken up with the retailers of the state and they are being warned not to buy any potatoes from growers the sacks of which are not stamped with the grade and the grower's name, and so stenciled. The market agent also urges housewives to report any violations of the law.

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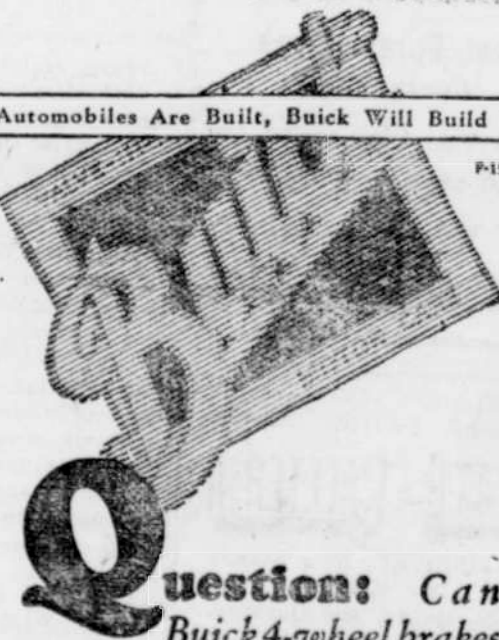
