

How to Keep Your Starting and Lighting System in Good Working Order.

EVERY battery requires some attention. A little service at regular intervals will pay big dividends in the length of the life of a battery.

This care is not difficult or complicated and any Ford owner can handle it once he understands what is necessary.

Here are five simple rules to observe which will insure constant satisfactory service and longer life for your battery at little expense.

1. Every two weeks see that the acid solution in each of the three cells in the battery covers the metal plates by approximately one-half inch.

2. Keep all connections and terminals tight (particularly the hold down clamp bolts to keep battery securely in carrier).

3. Keep the battery terminals clean and free from dirt.

4. Apply vaseline (petroleum jelly) to the terminals occasionally to prevent corrosion.

5. Allow the authorized Ford dealer nearest you to inspect your battery once a month.
