It cost \$249,967.43 to conduct the Salem public schools during the last school year.

Since January 1, 117 licenses to wed have been issued in Jackson county and 27 divorce complaints filed.

Ida Ward, 16, Elizabeth McCloud, 16, and Aileen Corey, 18, escaped from the state industrial school at Salem.

The national forest offices at Eugene has begun sending out its look-outs, which is somewhat earlier than usual.

The Casey lumber mill was destroyed by a fire last week. The mill was located near Meacham in the Blue mountains.

A dwelling, a blacksmith shop and a store building containing the post-office, were practically destroyed by fire at St. Paul.
