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**SUIT INSTITUTED**

A suit has been instituted in circuit court in Multnomah county to restrain the directors of school Dist. No. 1, their principals and teachers, from using the pupils of the public schools for other than educational purposes. It seems that the children have been used as a sort of auxiliary collection agency for every "drive" from the Red Cross and Community Chest down to collecting pennies for the rehabilitation of "Old Ironsides," for the secretary of the navy; and other pennies for some "Trust" company or other to loan at a profit under the guise of teaching the children to boycott Wrigley, Beeman, Jensen and Von Herberg, Woodlaw, et al, by saving such pennies. The good-natured, accommodating members of the school board, not having the actual work, incident to such "collections" to do, readily consent to its being carried on in the public schools, and, "be it therefore ordered: that the secretary be instructed to advise the superintendent of schools of this action in the matter, etc."

Forthwith the superintendent calls a meeting of the principals, and they are advised that the honorable members of the board wish them to lay aside all and singular their business, as educators, and attend to marshaling this corps of instructors, who, in turn, are to lay aside their profession "teaching the young idea to shoot;" and instruct the children in commercialism; i. e.: the gathering in of the coin of the realm, shekels, filthy lucre, moloch, or the golden calf, by whatever name one chooses to apply to it; so that the salaried representation of these different organizations may wax fat through the prostitution of our public schools. The public taxes should be used in the maintenance of the public schools for the education of the youth of the land, and for no other purpose. The golden opportunity of youth at the fountain of knowledge should not be diverted by catch-penny schemes, whether it be for the enrichment of the individual, who is brought in from outside the state to conduct a "drive," or make up the deficit of a couple of hotels run under the guise of charitable associations—that, having no rent or taxes to pay, rent rooms and sell food cheaper than the hotel and restaurant with these overhead expenses. The children of the public schools should not be called upon to assist in such commercialism. Every moment devoted to matters outside the purpose for which our public schools are maintained is robbing the child of its right; and every moment devoted to such outside matters by the superintendent, principal, and teacher, is a breach of trust—a waste of taxpayers' funds—a diversion to other uses than those for which levied and collected, and they should be enjoined from using the district's funds in the payment of salaries, when any portion of their time is devoted to these outside matters, not prescribed in the course of study.

One of the last letters written by the late William Jennings Bryan was a personal one to the Master of the National Grange, in which in vigorous terms Mr. Bryan expressed his appreciation of the grange as an organization of service to the farmers of America.

George A. Palmiter, master of the Oregon State Grange, recently uttered this significant sentence:—"Something is wrong with our methods of marketing, when the aggregate money value of a large crop of primary necessity is smaller than the value of a smaller crop."

**Dairy Cow Testing and Feeding Demonstration**

World's Record Cow for Milk Production—37,381.4 Pounds in One Year—Born April 10, 1913, Died March 10, 1925. Owned and Developed by Carnation Milk Farms, Seattle, Washington.

One of the features of the Dairy Section at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, Portland, October 31st to Nov. 7th, will be a demonstration of testing for butterfat and cost accounting of feed of two groups of dairy cattle, using five average Oregon cows in one group. These cows will give about 4000 pounds of milk per year, which is about Oregon's standard and the standard of the United States, too.

In another group will be five purebred cows, featuring each of the five well-known breeds whose production will be from 8,000 to 12,000 pounds of milk per year. Purebred cattle have productions of more than this amount but it is thought to impress the public of the desirability of owning a string of well bred cows which shall give at least twice as much as the average Oregon cow—the cost of these cows being not greatly in excess of good grade cows and with a possibility, during times when calves are in demand, of making for their owners,

on top of their milk and cream check, some added money from their offspring.

Prof. P. M. Brandt of Oregon Agriculture College has been requested to take charge of this exhibit which will also feature daily tests for butterfat by accredited testers of the state so that lay people may get a close-up of what testing really means. A chart for each animal will show exactly the amount of milk they produce at each milking and the exact amount of butterfat in their milk for that day. The amount of feed given to each of these animals in the various groups will also be tabulated, which will clearly show that, although an animal giving a good flow of milk takes more feed than a scrub animal, that the differences in this amount of feed do not correspond to the difference in production.

This exhibit will be housed prominently in the dairy barn and is expected to attract a great deal of attention.
