CLACKAMAS FAIR APPROVED.

Action of backers of the county fair may obtain a \$3500 appropriation from the county next year, according to approval for the plan, voted by members of the budget committee in session Tuesday at Oregon City. Other new funds that may be established this year are \$5000 for a county poor farm and \$1800 for a boys' and girls' club leader.

The three items may be included in the draft of the budget as it will be submitted to the taxpayers of the county at the annual budget meeting, although final decision on all expenditures has not been made as yet by the committee. County Judge H. E. Cross, Commissioners C. W. Kruse and Richard Wright, H. H. Chindren, M. C. Glover and John F. Riskey form the special committee.

The group voted Tuesday to include an item of \$50,000 for the reduction of outstanding indebtedness, provided that the sum did not run the total expense over 6 per cent more than the 1925 total.

Those backing the movement to establish a fund for a young people's club leader believe that the county will benefit from such a step. County Agent W. A. Holt has carried on the work of directing the club activities during the last few years, in addition to his other duties, but the expansion of the work is held to necessitate the employment of a leader for club work alone.

The expenditure of the \$5000 fund to start a poor farm has not been worked out by the committee, but the court has several sites in mind.

Last year's budget included an item of \$2000 as a fund to provide work for county prisoners, but such work has never been carried out, and the fund is held against the time when some system of work for prisoners is outlined. The money would form a revolving fund for the work.

Another item from the 125 budget, as yet unused, is \$101,000 for the revaluation of property in the county.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis—Aggie grads from near and far will trek back to their alma mater much earlier this year than usual as annual homecoming has been set for October 31, just two weeks away.

Elaborate preparations are already under way by a host of committees under command of Gordon Pratt of Portland, homecoming chairman. A slogan is being selected through a student contest. Last year's rallying cry was "Home Again, Win Again."

Montana university will furnish the opposition for Schissler's Fighting Aggies this year, and indications point to plenty of opposition on both sides of the line on Bell field that day. Never in the memory of the oldest inhabitant have the Aggies had so speedy an aggregation, while the Grizzlies boast the fastest back field flash in the conference in Sweet, who cleaned up the dashes in the coast track meet last spring.
