This prediction was made by Frank O. Lowden, ex-governor of Illinois and president of the American Dairy Federation, at a speech in Oakland, California, November 18. And why not? asks the state market agent. The surprising thing is that farmers have so long permitted the middle interests to make what profits that are made on farm products. No other industry of power would year after year produce and sell at about cost and permit others to resell the products at a six per cent advance. There is no good reason on earth, says the market agent, why producers themselves cannot handle their products all the way through to the consumer. There is no good reason why they cannot be their own middle men. When they do bring this about the bridge between the grower and eater can be materially shortened and both classes be benefited. Consumption of all farm products would greatly increase if prices to the consumer could be lowered—if many of the unnecessary middle profits and expenses could be eliminated. If the farmer could retain half the profits that others make off his products he could make money. If the consumer could get the other half of profits in reduced prices, there would be greatly increased buying. When farmers solidly organize to sell their own goods they will have accomplished much for themselves.

The ex-Crown Prince of Germany has gotten himself in a pickle. He bought a pair of silk socks for "his wife," and the town gossips discovered them on the legs of his private secretary. Over here we would not worry over a little thing as that. It would be our chief delight if the socks were properly filled, no matter who wore them.

The sheriff of a county down in Florida has been indicted and will be tried on a charge of second degree murder. The killing took place when a prisoner in his charge attempted a jail break. This looks like another instance when the welfare of the criminal comes first.

Official sanction has been given by the Forest Service to cutting Christmas trees. Only do not cut on another's land, leave plenty standing, and do not act the hog about it.

As framed, the new federal bill is planned to raise \$2,426,754,000 to run the country one year. It will be more than \$21 to be paid by every man, woman and child, including babies in America to the federal government in taxes. In addition, there are state and local taxes. And the biggest of all cuts that could be made in taxes would be to help make permanent peace and end most of the war cost.

### CHAMBERLAIN IS STRONG DEFENDER OF ALASKA ROAD.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(Washington Bureau of the Journal)—"It would be an act of supreme folly to abandon the Alaskan railroad," says former Senator George E. Chamberlain of Oregon, who was in charge of the bill for its construction when that measure passed the senate. Congressman Free of California has advocated tearing up the rails because it has been unprofitable.

"I was in charge of the bill in the senate for the construction of the Alaska railroad," said Chamberlain, "and I know very well what the sentiment was at that time. I have not been discouraged because progress in the development of Alaska has been slow.

"It would be an act of supreme folly to abandon the road or to fail to keep it up along the lines of the report of the general manager, who points out the need of replacing wooden piling and other flimsy structures with masonry and other permanent improvements.

### Mineral Storehouse.

"Everyone knew when the road was built that it would not be and could not be a paying venture in the near future.

"Everyone realized, however, that Alaska is a great mineral storehouse and that eventually there would be industrial, agricultural and other development equalling the mineral output.

"I have at hand only some earlier statistics, but from these we learn that while \$7,000,000 was paid for Alaska it returned \$150,000,000 from fish, furs and gold in less than 40 years after the purchase and furnished a market for \$100,000,000 worth of products from the states.

### Has Great Future.

"That is only a drop in the bucket as compared to what is likely to come out of Alaska in the years to come.

"Its coal and timber reserves are enormous and other developments will come with the years. If we had at some periods in the past applied the same reasoning to the Union Pacific or some of our other transcontinental lines, as the destructionists now apply to Alaska, these roads would have been torn up and the development of the country postponed.

"I think the gentlemen in congress who talk of tearing up the rails had better devote themselves to the formulation of a code that will give Alaska an efficient administration, which it has not had because of the mixed authority, the lack of power in the hands
