OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the public school at Malin.

Construction of an eight-story office building was announced at Salem. The structure will cost approximately \$100,000.

Christmas programs and special dinners marked the observance of Christmas at the various institutions at Salem.

William Ellsworth Purdy, 63, candidate in 1924 for representative in congress from the first congressional district died in Salem.

A total of \$1373 was taken in by Fred A. Miller, Clackamas county clerk, in hunting, angling and similar licenses during 1925.

Returns available from Oregon's 18th annual Christmas seal sale indicates that final returns will safely pass the \$50,000 mark.

Three young men, all under the age of 22 years, made an unsuccessful attempt to rob the State bank of Scotts Mills. The robbers escaped.

P. M. Lundquist of Dundee was killed when the auto he was driving was struck at a grade crossing just north of Dundee by a southbound Southern Pacific train.

Archie Cody, slayer of Sheriff Goodman of Harney county, must pay the death penalty for his crime, according to an opinion handed down by the state supreme court.

Investigation of existing first and second-class express rates from Portland and Spokane to points in Oregon east of Pendleton has been ordered by the public service commission.

Reports from the vicinity of the Santiam pass road state that the pass is practically free from snow and if the road were paved travel into eastern Oregon would be comparatively easy.

Mothers and fathers are purchasing cigarettes for their minor children and are permitting such children to smoke in their homes, it was stated at a recent session of the Cottage Grove city council.

Oregon City's school population has decreased instead of increased during the past year. The 1924 census showed there were 1941 children of school age, and the census for 1925 showed that there were 1921.

An effort will be made by Congressman Willis C. Hawley of Salem and Senator Stanfield to include an emergency appropriation for the continuance of the federal employment office at Eugene and Medford.

Suit to test the so-called motor vehicle registration law, now in operation in Oregon, probably will be filed in the circuit court at Salem soon. It was said that a Eugene attorney is preparing papers in the case.

Sheriffs and other peace officers of Oregon were requested in a letter prepared by the secretary of state not to issue temporary license plates to motor vehicle owners whose machines have heretofore been licensed.

Dr. Earl McFarland, collector of customs at Portland, was complimented by General Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, on the showing of the Portland office in apprehending liquor smugglers.

Sweet peas blooming outdoors at Christmas time is a rare thing even in the mild climate of Oregon, but at Sweet Home, George Flanagan Jr. showed a bouquet of these flowers which he had picked in his yard.

Two of the largest timber-holding concerns in Klamath county, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company and the Long-Bell Lumber company, have entered a strenuous protest against the proposed re-creation of Klamath timber.

The renomination of Postmaster J. N. Jones of Portland, whose commission expired Wednesday, will probably be sent to the senate immediately after it convenes. Both Senator Stanfield and Congressman Crumpacker of Portland have recommended Jones' re-appointment.

Linn county's tax situation shows an improvement this year for the first time since the United States entered the World war. The taxes for the county were reduced by about \$21,000 and in addition the assessed valuation is lower this year by \$216,316 than it was in 1925.

Oregon farmers are receiving a smaller return from their cash crops this year than last, the department of agriculture indicates in its final report for the present season. The price of corn has declined under the influence of a banner crop, while barley has been similarly affected, but the market price of rye has declined in the face of a smaller yield than that of last year. The Oregon commercial apple is bringing more than that of last year, and the same is true of peaches, hops and clover seed.

Gold Hill, which recently voted an additional bond issue of \$15,000 to reconstruct its water system, will have its water rates increased from 15 to 100 per cent, the city council has announced.

One hundred and four mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending November 28, manufactured 93,041,098 of feet lumber; sold 114,726,079 feet and shipped \$7,261,685 feet.

Moving pictures are being put on every week at the Sandy Union high school, receipts from which are being used to buy library books, make payments on a new piano and maintain the band and orchestra.

There were 22,312 traffic accidents in Portland during the fiscal year ending November 30, and a total of 35 deaths from automobile accidents, according to figures compiled. Of the 35 deaths 11 were due to drunken drivers.

More than 100 Forest Grove high school students were reinstated in their classes after a spectacular strike in protest against a three-day suspension of a small group for "cutting" classes to attend a recent football game at Independence.

Purchase of the plant and line of the Tillamook County Mutual Telephone company by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company was formally approved by the interstate commerce commission, which found the merger to be in the public interest.

Another large water-filled crater has made its appearance in the Tumalo reservoir basin, the result of a cave-in of part of the reservoir floor. This new hole is 35 feet in depth and is the largest of a series of holes above a subterranean cavern.

The state supreme court has held as legal an assessment of 5 cents an acre levied against all lands in the Ochoco irrigation district in Crook county. The assessment was levied by the board of directors of the district to pay for the cost of delinquencies.
