Large shipments of eastern corn which have been coming west for the last several years show that there is a field in some sections for expanding the corn acreage, and that in western Oregon, there is a large opportunity for growing more Hannchen barley. Feeders of larger kinds of livestock have recognized the merit of Hannchen for a number of years, but now poultrymen are beginning to use it in considerable quantities.

Experiment station workers believe that many acres of eastern Oregon devoted to common white oats can well be replaced with Hannchen barley.

In pruning cherry or walnut trees, Oregon farmers practice thinning out, as those trees are thick and tall, making them difficult to handle. Orchardists are advised by the experiment station to thin out the bearing wood, so that the light can get down through the trees.
