

**Mayan Civilization
Mystery of History**

The great mystery of the Mayan civilization is that of its calendar. As early as 300 A. D. and possibly much earlier, the Maya had developed a method of reckoning time which is quite as accurate as our own. The problem of adjusting the length of the year to the uneven number of days which it contains had been solved. The complete Maya calendar is capable of fixing any given date exactly and uniquely in a period of over 5,000,000 years, says E. E. Free in the Forum.

This calendar and the mass of astronomical knowledge which must lie back of it, appeared in Central America suddenly. No history has been traced for its origins. One century it is not there; the next century it is there. Some experts believe that the Maya culture was imported, possibly from India or from Egypt. Others believe that it originated in America, at

places not yet discovered, or that its relics, being perishable, have disappeared.

STANFIELD WORKING FOR REFUND OF TAX
His Influence as Chairman of Public Lands Committee is Big Boost for Return of \$4,907,000 to 18 Western Oregon Counties.



The fact that United States Senator Robert N. Stanfield is chairman of the senate committee on public lands is the principal ground for the belief that his bill for the payment of \$4,907,000 of lost O. & C. land grant taxes to 18 western Oregon counties has a chance to pass the senate. The bill, which benefits the entire state, is now before the committee and in his charge.

A new senator would be barred by the senate's iron-clad seniority rule from holding such a powerful chairmanship, and therefore, would be unable to advance such legislation through the committee and pass it in the senate.

Immediate payments will be made to the 18 counties if the bill passes, in the following amounts: Benton, \$230,000; Clackamas, \$347,000; Columbia, \$111,000; Coos, \$422,000; Curry, \$22,000; Douglas, \$1,085,000; Jackson, \$756,000; Josephine, \$379,000; Lincoln, \$22,000; Lane, \$926,000; Linn, \$129,000; Marion, \$10,000; Multnomah, \$38,000; Polk, \$165,000; Tillamook, \$30,000; Yamhill, \$50,000; Washington, \$50,000; Klamath, \$135,000.

The Stanfield bill further provides for the annual payment hereafter of nearly \$500,000, an amount equal to the taxes that would have been paid to the counties annually by the railroad company on the O. & C. grant lands.
