NATURAL DRAFT DRYERS CHANGED TO FAN TYPES

Oregon prune growers with natural draft dryers can well afford to improve them with fans according to E. H. Wiegand, professor of horticultural products at O. A. C. Approximately 70 to 80 million tons of dried prunes will be produced in Oregon this year, a great increase over other years, and this requires additional drier space.

"An increase of at least 75 per cent is accomplished by the installation of fans in the ordinary natural draft dryer," says professor Wiegand. "The more modern types of driers are circulation types with fans, using cars instead of sliding trays in runways. Contrary to the general view of handling recirculated air, driers are built much longer than the old tunnel to decrease the temperature of the drying air. The length of the tunnel improves the quality of the fruit." The entrance temperature is between 150 and 165 degrees F., and

is gradually decreased to a finishing temperature of not exceeding 120 degrees. This prevents to a great extent bleeding and dripping of fruit caused by expansion of the fruit juice when it comes into contact with the hot air. Washing in running water, hot or cold, is substituted for ly dipping, which ruins many good prunes.

Careful harvesting of prunes removes brown rotted fruit before it is dried. Brown rot-infected fruit decreases the quality of the pack and naturally makes the product less salable. Picking belts in front of the dipper facilitate the removal of inferior grades of fruit, thus increasing the capacity of the drier by giving space to good fruit.

LOCAL GINSENG GARDEN MAKES LARGEST SEED SALE

John Osborne, owner of the largest ginseng garden in Estacada, sells yearly 100,000 ginseng seed. The supply of seed cannot fill the demand so there should be more than the thirty-five ginseng gardens already in this district. A small amount of land put into ginseng will net a large profit as ginseng seeds sell for about \$2.00 or \$2.25 a pound, and the roots sell for from \$8.00 to \$14.00 a pound, depending on the quality.

Mr. Osborne started his garden ten years ago by transplanting from the garden of Jerry Jones, who having learned about ginseng in the east started the production in Estacada. One hundred thousand seed

and twenty-four plants made up Mr. Osborne's first garden. The ginseng plants he now cultivates cannot be counted.

Golden seal is planted in Mr. Osborne's patch after he has harvested a crop of ginseng because disease might attack the roots of ginseng is an alternate is used. The golden seal plant also thrives on Estacada's well drained slopes. Ginseng and golden seal must be grown on sloping land or they rust.

As the ginseng plants require twenty-five percent sunshine, artificial shade must be provided. Lattices made of shakes are suspended over the plants; these are taken down in the winter. The sunlight moves constantly and thus reaches all the plants, and is distributed evenly over them as if they were growing in natural forests. Ginseng is a medical plant used mostly by the Chinese, so after the roots are dug and dried the product is shipped to the East. Much of the seed, however, is sold locally.

The land in Estacada is hard to beat as favorable soil in which to grow ginseng. If more gardens are planted there will be organization of producers and better prices and market conditions will be available. This is what the small number of present producers want. They also want to make Estacada famous for its ginseng and will rejoice over a growth of farm population which the production of this plant will bring.

SECOND MOTH COVER SPRAY SHOULD BE APPLIED NOW

The second codling moth cover spray on apples and pears should be applied now, as codling moths have laid numerous eggs on the fruit and foliage of pears and apples during the past week of warm weather. The eggs will hatch in from 8 to 16 days depending upon the temperature and apples and pears should be covered with a spray before the worms reach them.

The spray used to poison the worms is lead arsenate powder used at the rate of 2 to 4 pounds to 100 gallons of water.

FARM REMINDERS

Canning Oregon strawberries is easily done if the fruit is placed in jars after steaming and washing, says the horticultural products department at the college. The fruit is covered with a hot syrup made of 6 pounds of sugar and 4 pounds of water. The lid and rubber are placed on the jar lightly. The jar is cooked in a washboiler of boiling water 20 minutes for quarts and 15 minutes for pints. After cooking the jar is upended away from a draft to cool.
