Last sad rites for Mrs. Elizabeth Sparks, wife of A. E. Sparks, of this place, who passed on Sunday afternoon, August 1, 1926, at St. Vincent hospital, Portland, with complications following an operation for appendicitis just two weeks before, were held from Finley & Son's chapel, Portland, on Wednesday, August 4, at 10 o'clock a. m. committal being made in Riverview cemetery. Rev. Lloyd B. Carrick, a Presbyterian minister of Portland, officiated, while the services at the grave were in charge of Mountain Chapter, O. E. S., of Estacada.

Deceased was born in Albany, N. Y., on the 20th day of November, 1859, being 67 years of age. She was a teacher in the Fort Dodge, Iowa, city schools for seven years prior to her marriage to Alexander E. Sparks at Ponce, Nebraska, in 1887, and resided at Dixon, Nebraska, for a number of years.

Mr. and Mrs. Sparks came to Oregon in 1902 and in 1906 located in Estacada, being among the first and most prominently identified residents. Deceased was a charter member of Mountain Chapter, No. 108, O. E. S. of this place and also a member of the Past Matron's Club, of which she always took a prominent part and was a much valued and loved member who will be greatly missed. She was a woman of strong character, had hosts of friends and was greatly loved by those who knew her best.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a half brother, Mr. Will Springer, of Manson, Iowa, and two half sisters, Mrs. G. K. Todd and Mrs. Dora Mercle, of Fort Dodge, Iowa.

**NOTES OF INTEREST TO FARMER READERS**

The Agricultural Committee of the Oklahoma Bankers Association, in its report, recommends that the bankers see that a competent agent is appointed in each county and that he has a degree from some agricultural college. They believe that the agricultural possibilities of the state should be better advertised and that each county bankers association should do some work along that line.

Searcy County Bankers Association, Arkansas, entertained as its guests recently some seventy-five farmers and business men. The result was the organization of the North Central Arkansas Agricultural Association its purpose will be to co-ordinate the efforts of the farmers and business men in promoting a better agriculture. Searcy County bankers are giving 100 settlings of purebred eggs for distribution to the boys' and girls' clubs in the county.

H. S. Mowrer, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the New Jersey Bankers Association, together with H. J. Baker, director of extension work in the College of Agriculture, made a complete tour of the state this spring, calling on the county agents and agricultural committees of the various county organizations to get a definite line-up on the work done and the plans for the coming year. Ways and means for furthering the program of the state committee were considered at these conferences.
