Plans are very near completed, if not entirely so, for a grand celebration and barbecue at Estacada on Labor Day, September 6th, as work will be completed on the Highway between Carver and Estacada. There is no reason why the citizens of Estacada, Springwater, Currinsville, Eagle Creek, George, Bissell, Barton and Carver should not all join in making the affair a grand success.

It will not be having a good, sociable time only; but will be an advertisement in a way that will bring the whole locality to the attention of the outside public.

A program has been suggested with a parade, leaving Estacada at 9 o'clock in the morning, going down the Highway to Carver, crossing the river and returning by the way of Springwater. PRICE MAKES FLYING START IN CANDIDACY

Al A. Price, president of Price Bros. Department Store, and one of the city's most prominent merchants, is making a flying start for a seat in the legislative hall at Salem by starting his advertising campaign early. Mr. Price is democratic nominee, and intends to wage an aggressive campaign, with the idea that he will be one of the three men sent from Clackamas county.

With a record of civic activities perhaps equalled by no other man in the county, Mr. Price has had a hand in practically every forward movement started here during the past 25 years. He has been an active booster for a great many city and county projects, and has had considerable to do with organization work. He has never taken a great part in politics except within the past few years.

He was chairman of the county democratic central committee at the time of his nomination, and previously served on the county tax conservation committee. He is a stonemason, an Elk and a Woodman, a member of the board of the Chamber of Commerce, and has served on budget committees for both the city and county. He was an indefatigable worker for pure water for Oregon City, and had more to do with the installation of a modern fire fighting equipment here than any other one man.

Mr. Price has also been an ardent supporter of the good roads movement, and has been active in projects designed to cement the interests of town and county people. During his 25 years' business experience in Oregon City, Al Price has perhaps met more people and made more friends than fails to the lot of the average man, and from the indications coming into his campaign headquarters, the possibility of his election as one of the three representatives appears to be admitted.—Oregon City Enterprise.
