But it should be remembered he was an artist.

Valentino himself rebelled against the unfortunate characterization that adhered to him, in the popular fancy, from an early role. The term "sheik" was hateful to his ears, and with all the vehemence at his command he protested that he was worthy of a higher rating, as man and artist. And in truth he was. The success of Valentino may be attributed only in part to his charm of feature and his physical grace. As for the remainder, the man was an actor, and given to his destined work. Not so great, perhaps, as Chaplin, who loses himself in a role, but nevertheless an admirable member of that motley company recruited to the new art.

Vale, Valentino. Within the year to be well-nigh forgotten, while another plays the role you would have played. This is the impermanence of the films.—Oregonian.

**OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST**

**Brief of Resume of Happenings the Week Collected for Our Readers.**

Herman Pohle, who died at Salem recently, left an estate valued at \$82,110.

Grant Baldere, 22, of Mill City, was drowned in the Santiam river near Ender when he slipped and fell from a log.

Approximately 200 acres of hops on the Thomas Livesley ranch near Salem went down as a result of the recent rains.

The crop of pears is so heavy in the Harrisburg vicinity that orchardists are asking people to come and carry them away at their own price.

A gold brick, estimated to be worth \$15,000 has been on display at the Basche-Sage hardware company's store in Baker. The brick is from the Buffalo mine.

Harry C. Peterson of Brookings, confessed to District Attorney Buffington of Curry county at Gold Beach, that he had set fire to his wife's house at Brookings.

With hundreds of exhibits in place, Bend held its 13th annual flower show, the leading prize, the Bend chamber of commerce trophy, going to Mrs. Ralph Spencer.

The Sternberg tannery at Albany that was recently destroyed by fire will be rebuilt, business men having raised \$15,000 as a loan for six years without interest.

A petition was filed with the public service commission by the city of Marshfield asking for an order requiring the Coos Bay Water company to extend its service.

A proposition to issue bonds to the amount of \$1500, with which to install a water system, septic tanks and electric lights in the Boring schoolhouse, was voted down.

Ether Motaic, full-blood Cayuse Indian maiden of the Umatilla Indian reservation, will be queen of the Pendleton roundup September 15 to 18, inclusive, it is announced.

The property of the Eastern Oregon state hospital, in Umatilla county, has been set aside as a wild game and bird refuge, according to a proclamation issued by Governor Pierce.

In a rage because she refused him funds to attend the Trail-to-Rail celebration in Eugene, Joseph Planz, 39, shot his wife twice in the back and killed himself at Klamath Falls.

Frank Hooson, 52, sign painter of Portland, died in Spokane, Wash., a few hours after his automobile had been struck by a Northern Pacific passenger train near Granite, Idaho.

If there are no remonstrances within the next few days, construction will begin on a \$350,000 union high school building at Klamath Falls. The new school will benefit four districts.

Practically the entire population of Sweet Home, Holly, Crawfordville and Foster is now engaged in picking evergreen blackberries. About two truckloads a day are being shipped.

Extensions, improvements and additions to the Ashland municipal water supply have been agreed upon by the city council. The total cost of the improvements was estimated at \$500,000.

A live deer was brought to Waldport by Frank Johnson, who had picked it up on his farm. The animal was in pitiful condition from a strange malady, believed possibly to be the hoot-and-mouth disease.

Five persons were killed and 222 persons were injured in 1719 traffic accidents in the state of Oregon during the month of August, according to the report of T. A. Raffety, chief inspector for the state motor division.

According to Emil Britt, weather observer at Jacksonville, the recent rain broke the longest dry spell in Jacksonville in more than 40 years. There was a period of drought of 102 days, only .05 of an inch falling in that time.

George R. Reeves, Portland contractor, was low with a bid of \$97,300 for construction of the first unit of the Columbia hospital to be erected at Astoria by the Columbia conference of the Augustina Lutheran synod.

The Drager Fruit company of Salem has made application for permission to operate a licensed warehouse under the federal warehouse law. This would be the first federal licensed warehouse to be operated in the Salem district.

The Mabel Mill company is reported to have purchased the 30,000-acre Drew timber tract above Rolley and will tap the new holdings with a logging railroad for which a survey already has been made. As surveyed, the line would run from Fox creek, eight miles east of Rolley, to Mabel in Lane county, where the company has its mill.
