A REAL ACHIEVEMENT

One of the real achievements of this country during the past seven years and one which is not always fully realized, was pointed out recently in an address by Secretary of Commerce Hoover, in New York. That achievement is the recreation of a sound American individualism at a time when because of post-war influences, most of the nations of the world have been hastening toward the autocracy of socialism or of the dictatorship.

Mr. Hoover pointed out how the nation has recovered from the effects of the war with unparalleled speed, has almost abolished poverty, has spent additional millions on the education an betterment of its children and has found time and means to assist the stricken nations of Europe to recover. And this was accomplished at a time when there was a demand throughout the world that governments continue war ownership and war operation of industry in time of peace, "a creeping state of socialism" the secretary declared, against which our national government turned its face and began to "unlock the fetters which, from necessity in time of war we had fastened on individual enterprises and opportunity."

This indeed has been one of the most remarkable accomplishments of post-war American statesmanship. As the Secretary of Commerce further stated, twentieth-century socialism has been challenged "with a new twentieth century American individualism and we are ready to compare six years experiences in recovery and prosperity with every country which has been infected with these policies."

Any such comparison of course will be all in favor of the American individualistic theory. We have only to turn, of course, to the late of Russia to get all the data we want on the subject.

The recovery of America has been indeed remarkable. It has been due of course to the constructive policies which the American government has followed since the war.

But back of this even as Mr. Hoover has pointed out, is the broad fact that we merged from the war determined to resist socialism and state bureaucracy, and to create anew the intensive American individualism which has made all of our progress and prosperity possible. And this determination has been carried out.

ROTATION AS FERTILIZER

That crop rotation is as effective in increasing soil fertility as the use of manure or commercial fertilizers has been demonstrated by numerous experiments carried on in this country and England, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Furthermore, crop rotation as ordinarily practiced does not entail any additional cost. The extra yield due to this practice is therefore a profit that may be credited to the farmer's managerial ability.

Corn at the Missouri agricultural experiment station yielded 22.4 bushels per acre from cultivation alone. When the crop was measured the yield was increased by 14.7 bushels, or to 37.1 bushels per acre; when it was grown in rotation with other crops the production was 15.1 bushels greater, or 37.5 bushels per acre. When manuring and rotation were both practiced the acre yield was increased by 25.3 or to a total of 47.7 bushels per acre.

FIRE FOOLISHNESS

A heart-rending message, received by Extension Forester Tyron of South Carolina, makes us realize the heavy loss caused by careless burning of woods. It reads:

"I am in grief. I wish something could be done. Thursday on coming home I found that my neighbor on my west had put fire out, or allowed it to be put out, giving us no notice. My whole timber land of young trees (some 70 acres) was burned. I could have cried if it would have done any good.

"Since I have owned this farm, have tried to educate my neighbors not to burn the woods. I have saved my woods twice by taking all hands and fighting the fire. I was not at home and did not know it was to be burned.

"Today this cherished parcel of 70 acres is only a charred mass—a mute testimony to the ignorance and consciousness of neighbors."

HOG HEALTH

A majority of the infectious diseases affecting hogs may be avoided through sanitation, quarantine and immunization. Pigs, sows and old pigs should not be allowed to feed on dusty or muddy ground, suitable feeding floors or platforms, preferably of concrete, and troughs of some non-absorbent material that

can be cleaned, washed and disinfected frequently are recommended. Some sort of automatic drinking fountain which does not overflow should be used. If wallow holes are provided, it is advisable to make them of concrete, so that they may be cleaned and disinfected from time to time.

Frequent cleaning of pens, sheds, chelters and hog lots, as well as troughs and feeding floors, is an important factor in disease prevention. It is imperative that the troughs be disinfected following outbreaks of infectious diseases. In addition to thorough cleaning at stated intervals, a liberal amount of laked lime should be applied in pens, houses, and adjoining lots. When disease appears in the herd, lose no time in calling a veterinarian so that a correct diagnosis may be made and proper treatment administered.

After all the crowding and pushing, hurrying and flower-throwing to welcome some celebrity is over, where do we find ourselves? Do not many of us go back to our avocations and think what fools we made of ourselves? And the recipient of these demonstrations may console themselves with the thought that the same mob under changed circumstances would cheer just as loudly to see them on their way to the gallows.
