WALTER CAMP, FATHER OF AMERICAN FOOTBALL

Built along athletic lines, Walter Camp was a leader of sports when he graduated from grammar school in New Haven half a century ago.

In 1876 he entered Yale University where he was a leader in all sports. He played in the first game of Rugby football against Harvard in 1876.

His great football mind enabled him to create the team of eleven players, the scrimmage and the quarterback. Before this there had been no orderly possession of the ball by either team. He later added the four down rule to football, which is one of the greatest steps in the history of the game.

As the game progressed Camp made more changes, such as abolishing mass play for faster and more open football. Another great change was introducing the low tackle to replace high tackling.

Camp's work, however, was not confined entirely to football. He is known as the father of the daily dozen and other health advancements. He has been the means of keeping many people physically fit.

Camp was considered one of the greatest sportsmen in the history of athletics because he

1. Played the game for his side.
2. Kept to the rules.
3. Kept a brave heart in defeat.
4. Kept faith with his comrades.
5. Kept himself fit.
6. Kept his temper.
7. Was modest in victory.
8. Had a soul, a clean mind and a healthy body.

It can be truly said that America has never had a man who did more, and tried to keep athletics cleaner than Walter Camp.
