Best Rice

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

Miss Julia Clements, secretary in the county agent's office, has been busy filing many new bulletins received from the Oregon Agricultural college and the United States Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C. The office is now supplied with samples and reserve copies of all of the bulletins of interest to Clackamas county.

County Agent Inskeep recently ordered a car of government Pyrotol. This is the fourth car of Pyrotol ordered for Clackamas county farmers since September by the county agent's office. The supply will probably last for one more year.

Orders are now being received for the fifth car to be delivered in February. The quicker the orders are filled the sooner the car will be ordered.

I. M. C. Anderson, county club agent, and family, are taking their annual vacation during the holidays visiting friends and relatives at Ontario, Oregon. They will return about January 1.

Ed Shearer, Springwater, has arranged with the county agent for a demonstration alfalfa plot, showing the relative merits of the ground limestone, barnyard manure, superphosphate and potassium sulphate on this important crop.

County Agent J. J. Inskeep recently received the appointment as Deputy Horticultural Inspector for Clackamas county and has been very busy inspecting strawberry plants for presence of strawberry weevil. Except for a few strawberry fields on unimproved roads this work is nearly completed.

Don C. Mote, extension entomologist of the Oregon Agricultural college has announced a new poison for strawberry weevil, discovered by the Oregon Experiment station in 1926. The new product is more effective and cheaper than commercial products used heretofore.

The county agent will see that Clackamas county strawberry growers have an available supply of the poison before harvest time.

Plans are now being made to hold a large meeting of strawberry growers later in the season, at which time the use of the poison will be explained.

WASHINGTON'S LICENSING LAW

In the state of Washington the licensing law provides that all commission merchants must pay \$25 for a license, must keep accurate and complete records of all transactions. When a commission merchant receives products to sell he must send the shipper a statement of the receipt of the products and their condition. Returns must be made within thirty days for products sold. A maximum commission of fifteen per cent is allowed. All commission merchants are bonded for \$5000. There is considerable agitation for a law that will better protect the farmers in Oregon and no doubt a bill will be introduced in the coming session of the legislature.
