"Wires" Sent by Pigeons

Before the invention of the electric telegraph, carrier pigeons provided the fastest known means of transmitting messages, and were even used by English stockbrokers to get early reports

on the market. The carrier pigeon is useful because of his accuracy in returning to his home, and the speed of his flight. He must be carefully trained over a long period. Pigeons have been known to carry a message as far as 500 miles in one day. During the Franco-Prussian war they were used by both armles to carry messages, but the invention of telegraph and wireless soon led to their abandonment.
