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## CARDWELL KILLED AT LADEE CAMP

Ross K. Cardwell, 40, superintendent for the LaDee Lumber company, met instant death beneath the wheels of a bunkhouse car on the tracks of the company about eight miles out of Estacada Saturday.

Cardwell was on a speeder and the bunkhouse car, the brakes of which had become defective or it had in some other manner become released, came upon him, knocking him under the wheels and causing death.

Coroner Pace investigated the case, and deciding that it was entirely accidental, did not order an inquest. The body was turned over to a Portland undertaking firm and the funeral will be held there.

Cardwell leaves his widow, Ida M. Cardwell, three brothers, James of Redding, Calif.; Carol of Brady, Wash.; and Orville of Bend, Ore., and a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Truax of Albany, Ore. Decedent was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Kelso, Wash., and Elk's Lodge of Chehalis, Wash., and other organizations. He was well known as a lumber expert and made his home at the camp. His permanent home was at Kelso, and he was a native son of Albany.

## NEW TRAFFIC LAWS EXPLAINED TO PUBLIC

The time will soon be at hand when the Traffic Laws passed by the Legislature will become effective and believing that the public should be informed of the various changes which have been made in our Motor Vehicle Laws and which will be in force about June 1, 1927, the traffic officers of Clackamas County with the assistance of the Eastern Clackamas News will present a series of articles informing the motoring public of these changes.

We feel that every motorist will co-operate with us when they thoroughly understand these laws and we sincerely ask the assistance of every car driver in helping us make the highways of this county and state safer for the motoring public.

The traffic officers patrolling your highways are placed there by their departments for your benefit to assist you in every way possible while using the public highways of your state.

This being the first of a series of articles, one of which will be published in this paper every week, pertaining to the above mentioned changes in the motor vehicle laws, the balance of our available space will be given to "Definition of Terms" as used in the motor vehicle laws and which are misunderstood by a large number of people.

Highway—Any road or highway designated by the state or county for the use of the public.

Hard Surface Highway—Any road or highway constructed or surfaced of any material which is commonly called pavement.

Vehicle—Any mechanical device of any kind moving by any other than human power over the highways of the state.

Motor Vehicle—Any self propelled vehicle moving over the highways of the state, excepting road rollers, farm tractors, fire engines, and police ambulances.

Motor Truck—Every motor vehicle designed and used for carrying, conveying, or moving over the highways of the state any freight, property, article or thing, which has a maximum load carrying capacity of one ton or more.

Solid Tired Vehicles—Any vehicle having two or more solid or metal tires.

Trailer—Any four wheeled vehicle of a load carrying capacity of one ton or more which is not propelled by its own power but is drawn behind or pushed in front of a self-propelled vehicle.

Semi-Trailer—Any two wheeled trailer or vehicle having a load carrying capacity of one ton or more used in connection with a four wheeled vehicle for carrying part of the load thereof.

Fire Width—Shall mean the measure taken on the cross section of the tread of the wheel.

Total Tire Width—Shall mean the sum of the widths of all wheels of a vehicle.

Owner—Shall mean any person, firm, association or corporation having the lawful use or control of any motor vehicle under contract or release or otherwise for a period of ten or more successive days.

Legal Owner—Shall mean the owner of a legal title to a vehicle.

Intersection—Shall mean the point or place where one highway or public way joins the other at an angle, whether or not it crosses same.
