COUNTY AGENT NOTES

A number of complaints have come to the county agent's office recently concerning peach leaf curl, a disease which has appeared on peach trees. On diseased trees the leaves assume a yellow tint and on closer inspection prove to be purple colored, thickened and curled. Many of the trees lose their leaves and some die. Peach leaf curl is controlled by spraying with Bordeaux mixture in December, January and early February. It is too late to control the disease this year. Information concerning the control of this and other first tree diseases may be secured at the county agent's office for the asking.

Alfalfa tests made in Washington County the past few years show that Grimm alfalfa grown from Montana and the Blackfoot section of Idaho are best adapted to local conditions. County Agent O. T. McWhorter recently held a field trip at which time a number of growers saw the superiority of Montana certified fields—the Montana Grimm is yielding 25 to 50 per cent more than other varieties.

A mixture to keep rodents and insects pests away from seed corn after planting is as follows: Mix two ounces of crude carbolic acid and two ounces of sweet oil. Pour this mixture over 60 pounds of shelled corn and stir thoroughly with a stick so that each kernel becomes coated.

Herman Kanne, president of the Clackamas County Jersey Breeders Association has announced that one hundred and forty animals have been entered for the Jersey Jubilee show to be held at Canby on May 27. Features of the show include a free lunch, a show by 4-H club members and judging contest. R. C. Kuehner, new Clackamas County club agent will be in charge of the club department.

Much interest is manifest by Clackamas County prune growers in the prune growers convention to be held at Corvallis, May 31 and June 1. At this convention growers and packers will take action to improve the prune marketing situation as recommended by the recent survey made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on this subject.

Chicks shouldn't be fed for about sixty hours after they are hatched. The egg yolk supplies them with their best first nourishment. When you do start to feed, however, feed often—but very little at a time. And always be sure all the feeds you give your chicks are of the best quality. Green feed is particularly valuable. It tends to keep the chicks in good physical condition. Milk also has a decidedly beneficial effect.

Chicks get a good deal of their living off the floor of the house or off the ground. In other words there is an excellent chance for them to pick up worm eggs and disease germs if there are many around. Not only should you keep the houses clean, but you should keep the soil over which the chicks range in a sweet and sanitary condition. Cultivate the soil often. Sow it to a green crop of some kind.

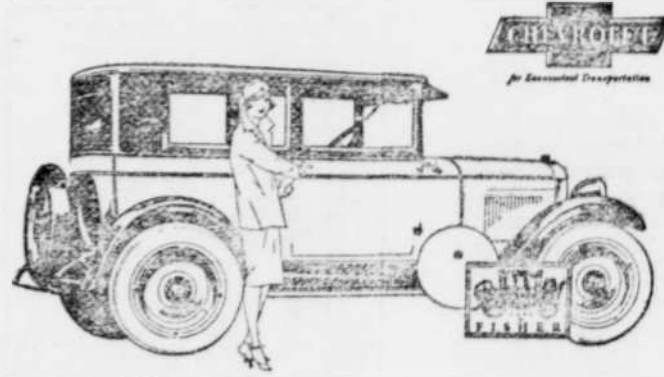
