Weekly County Agent News

Clackamas County farmers this week ordered through the County Agent's office three cars of lime from the State Lime Plant at Salem.

Orders were placed by the eaver-creek Cooperative Company, Ed Ott, Sunnyside, and Geo. Gilder, Portland to be shipped to Martin Springer, Sherwood.

In the cornbelt and colder parts of east farmers are forced to use short growing season leguminous crops, during the summer. The Willamette Valley is more fortunately situated. Common gray or Hungarian vetch makes a good green manure crop which is grown during the winter and early spring without the loss of a summers crop. Common grey vetch with rye, winter oats or wheat makes a good combination. The crop can be sown between row crops or in disced stubble in September and should be plow under about April 1st and not later than April 15.

When the soil responds to fertilizer the use of 400 pounds of superphosphate with vetch is often desirable.

The use of vetch in this manner will store up nitrogen and add to the organic matter in the soil for corn, late potatoes or other summer crops.

PARADICHLOROBENZINE

A lication of paradichlorobenzine from now until early Sept. will easily and cheaply control the prune root borer, most destructive of Oregon prune pests, says Clayton L. Long, extension specialist in horticulture at O. A. C.

"Applied in a circular band in the ground around the base of the prune tree, paradichlorobenzine generates gas that permeates the bark, killing the borer grub without injury to the tree itself. The method is far cheaper and less laborious than the old 'digging out' method where workers used a knife to 'worm' the trees," Long says.

"Paradi kills from 90 to 100 percent of the borers when applied under directions give nby the County agents in the prune growing counties. Right now it is most effective because the grubs are in the outer region of the bark. Later they will bore in and will become harder to reach."

The root borers not only cause outright killing of trees but usually devitalize a tree, causing poor yields, Long declares. He estimates probably damage to the state industry, counting actual loss of fruit and probably loss of vigor to trees at \$300,000.

All apples for interstate shipment are now required to be washed. Plan for a home made spray residue washing machine may no wbe seen at the county agents office.
