Weekly County Agent News

European earwigs are becoming numerous in various parts of Clackamas County. The directions are given herewith for mixing and applying the summer poison.
 Late summer poisoning. It is well to follow up the general application of poison brand bait by the use of small amounts of poison baits applied to trees, walls, and other objects several times during the summer, to catch the earwigs after they begin to climb at night.
 For this purpose it is well to have a mixture which will not dry for several days. This may be accomplished by substituting glycerin for a third of the amount of the liquid used. Oat hulls will make a mixture which will stick to objects better than wheat bran. The following mixture is suggested:
 Sodium fluoride..... 1 ounce
 Molasses..... 5 ounces
 Glycerin..... 5 ounces
 Water..... 5 ounces
 Oat hulls, about1 pound
 Mix by dissolving sodium fluoride in water first, add molasses and glycerin, and mix with enough oat hulls to make a wet mash. Smear pinches of this in the crochets of all trees; leave pellets of it at intervals of about six feet along all fences and walls, and along the top of the house foundation, in cracks of barns, and other buildings, or anywhere that the earwigs are seen crawling.
 Caution. Sodium fluoride is poisonous to human beings, but death from its use is rare. Wherever small children are present care should be taken to keep them from eating any of the poison bran. It should be scattered so that no large lumps be left on the ground. Material applied to trees and other objects should be placed beyond childrens reach. The same precautions should be used in regards to poultry. A thorough sprinkling of the grounds with water after the bran has been on a couple of days will wash out the poison.
