#### Granite Worn Smooth by Millions of Feet

Trails worn deep in the granite of Sawtooth mountain, towering 12,500 feet above sea level, tell the story today of hunting parties of primitive man. Says the Rocky Mountain News: How many years these trails were in the making even scientists have failed to fix.

From earliest times these Colorado mountains, now in the Cheatepe national forest, were the hunting place of man. Antelopes, deer, buffaloes and elk roamed in almost countless numbers, while the streams abounded with fish. Some believe the first white man a Spaniard, in 1540, crossed these wilds on his way west, and in the days of this adventurous Spaniard up to very recent years Indians swarmed through this wonderful hunting ground.

Trails across the mountains made by man and beast are still to be seen, and these worn into the solid granite of Sawtooth are mute evidence of the great lapse of time since the first man broke the way through the forest.

To the student vacationist these trails have proved of vast interest, as they have to scientists. They are a definite proof that man lived in Colorado in the dim past—how far back the anthropologist has not given even a guess.

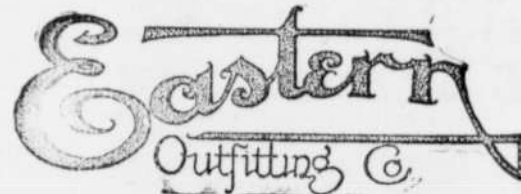
