Obituary of Clarence E. Reed

Clarence E. Reed was born near Sheboygan Falls, Wisconsin, September 30, 1858 and died at his home near Estacada, September 29, 1927, aged 68 years, 11 months and 29 days.

At the age of nine years Mr. Reed removed with his parents to Mower County, Minnesota residing there until the winter of 1881 when he went to Mahaska County, Iowa, locating on a farm north of Okaloosa where he remained until 1899. Here on December 22, 1886 he was united in marriage with Miss Alice Jack, who for forty years has shared with him life's joys and sorrows. Five children were born to this union. The years between 1899 and 1910 were spent at Ruthven, Iowa, where for a number of years Mr. Reed served the Farmers' Elevator Co. in the capacity of manager. In the spring of 1910 Mr. Reed was attracted to the newly opened agricultural lands of northern Montana and using his home steading right he filed on a half section of land near Inverness; here the family resided until the autumn of 1921 when they came to Estacada.

Mr. Reed was converted when a boy and united with the M. E. church of Racine, Minnesota. After moving to Iowa he became a member of the Newlight Christian church; this membership was never transferred. During his last illness he renewed his covenant with God and gave assurance of his faith in Christ as his Saviour.

Six years ago Mr. Reed suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never fully recovered, being a confirmed invalid during the past two years.

He was a most patient sufferer endeavoring himself to all about him by his thoughtful kindness at all times.

Those left to mourn are his devoted wife, his daughters, Mrs. William Nelson, of Eagle Creek and Mrs. Geo. Howell, of Estacada, two sons, Chas. W. and Ralph C. both of Estacada and one grandson, Virgil Nelson, also one brother, Geo. W. Reed and two sisters, Mrs. Lettie Smith and Mrs. E. E. Farmington all of Tillamook and a large number of nieces and nephews.
