**Ample Supply of Green  
 Peas is Always Delight**  
 An ample supply of green peas,  
 starchy with their own natural sweet-  
 ness and not requiring any additions  
 from the family sugar bowl, are the  
 pride and ambition of every garden-  
 er's heart. Peas from a single plant-  
 ing are to be had for only a short  
 time. The dwarf varieties most com-  
 monly grown in the home garden yield  
 for about ten days while the bush  
 peas, those which require brush or  
 wire supports and grow from three to  
 four feet tall, remain in good bearing  
 from two to three weeks. It is real  
 economy to plant the tall peas for  
 quantity. A succession of plantings  
 must be made to have a crop over any  
 long continued period.

**Useful Manure Floor**  
 The use of the manure floor or ster-  
 ility shed, with an occasional use of the  
 manure spreader is a step that goes  
 hand in hand with good dairy farm-  
 ing. Planning the rotation so that  
 manure may be supplied to the fields  
 at regular intervals as it is needed  
 to secure a uniform, steady crop pro-  
 duction that is a necessary part of  
 well-organized farm operation. Neg-  
 lecting the fields that are back from  
 the barn is a poor practice, rapidly  
 disappearing.

**Costly Dance of Birds**  
 It is said that sailors visiting the  
 island of Laysan, in the Hawaiian  
 group, are greatly amused by the curi-  
 ous antics of the Laysan albatross, or  
 peto. These birds sometimes perform,  
 in pairs, a kind of dance or as the  
 sailors call it, "catwalk." Two alba-  
 trosses approach each other, nodding  
 and making profound bows, cross their  
 bills, produce snapping and growling  
 sounds, rise on their toes, puff out  
 their breasts and finally part with  
 more nodding and bowing, only to  
 come together again and repeat the  
 performance. Occasionally there are  
 three or four in this singular antec-  
 ipation. The spectators are always im-  
 pressed with the extreme "politeness"  
 of the birds.
