Mrs. Rosa Douglass called on Mrs. Linnie Gibson Monday afternoon.

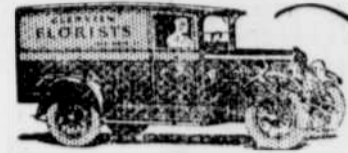

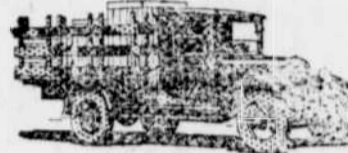
