Late Blight Has Appeared on Potatoes

The late blight disease of potatoes which caused rather serious losses last year has appeared in the late crop again this season in the Willamette and lower Columbia Valleys and in the coast sections of western Oregon.

So far as reduction of the yield is concerned the occurrence of the disease is quite insignificant. But from the standpoint of rot of the tubers after placed in storage this is quite a serious matter. It is not unusual to have half or more of the tubers destroyed by this late blight rot after they are in the bin. Trouble from this source could have been quite largely avoided by timely and thoroughly spraying of the growing plants with bordeaux during the latter part of the season. At this late date complete control of the rot cannot be secured though there are some things that can be done to materially reduce chances of serious rot.

First, the potato vines and the surface of the ground should be thor-

oughly sprayed by a solution of copper sulphate made up at the rate of one pound in 10 gallons of water. For your convenience in making a note of it, this formula will be repeated. Please observe that this solution makes use of the copper sulphate which is the chief ingredient of bordeaux mixture but it is quite different from bordeaux in that no lime is used for the avoidance of injury to foliage. The only object of spraying now is to kill the fungous spores on the foliage and on the surface of the soil so as to avoid infecting the tubers when they are dug from the ground. Foliage injury from this spray would be of no consequence and might even be a benefit hastening maturity of the plants. The formula for the spray to use then is Copper Sulphate 1 pound in 10 gallons of water.

A second factor in avoiding the late blight rot is to delay digging the crop for about two weeks after the vines are dead. This is for the purpose of allowing the spores produced on the green plants to germinate and die before the tubers are dug. If the tubers are dug before the spores are dead, heavy infection of rot may take place in the tubers as they come from the ground.

It is better to delay digging and thus reduce the chances of securing a high percentage of rot in storage. These measures just mentioned help to reduce the amount of rot. In regions where late blight is a common occurrence year after year, it is far safer to apply during the growing season, a regular spraying or dusting program making use of bordeaux mixture which is an effective preventive of blight.
