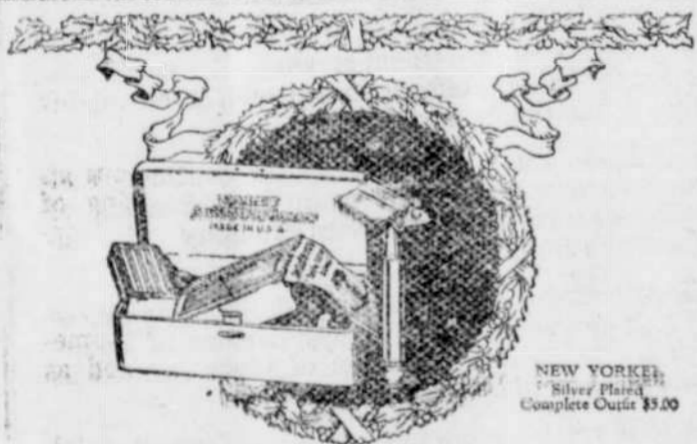
Why go to church? Did you ever consider going to church as an oppor-

Warning that the World War veterans stand to lose all rights to the Federal Adjusted Compensation "bonus" unless they act before January 1 was voiced by Colonel J. P. O'Neill, in announcing the opening of an information center at the U. S. Army Recruiting Offices, 209 Kraemer Bldg., 2nd and Washington Streets, Portland, Oregon to aid veterans in filing applications.

More than 500,000 exservice men throughout the country, with claims aggregating possibly half a billion dollars, have failed to apply, the War Department has informed Colonel O'Neill. Another group of 40,000 veterans have neglected to return applications sent them for correction. To date over 3,100,000 applications have been received at Washington.

Local veterans or relatives of deceased soldiers who visit the information center will be given every assistance in completing their applications and interpreting the regulations governing their cases. Blanks, addressed envelopes, and detailed instructions will be available. Finger printing facilities with an operator in attendance have been installed.
According to Colonel O'Neill, any

honorably discharged veteran who served in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps for more than 60 days between April 8, 1917, and July 1, 1919, providing he began his service before the Armistice, is eligible for the benefits of the Adjusted Compensation Law. To be valid applications must be filed on or before January 1, 1928.
