THREE ARRESTS FOR LIQUOR VIOLATIONS

LARGE QUANTITY OF MOONSHINE AND BEER FOUND BY OFFICERS

Deputy sheriffs Victor Thompson of Oregon City and D. M. Marshall and Jim Morris of Estacada, while hunting stills last week found four gallons of moonshine hid near Mt. Zion church in the Garfield district. Saturday night Norris and Thompson concealed themselves near the place and it was not long before Herb Huxley drove up in his Ford and proceeded to gather in the moonshine. He had two gallons in glass containers and was about to put them into the car when the officers placed him under arrest.

As soon as he saw that he was caught he crashed the two containers together and spilled the contents, most of it going on him. The officers secured the other two gallons left in the cache and proceeded to Oregon City with their prisoner. Huxley, it is said, was getting the moonshine with the intention of attending the Eagle Creek dance, where he was caught some months ago and convicted of a liquor charge.

It is believed by the officers that Huxley operated the still found the next day on Eagle Creek. On being bound over to the grand jury Huxley posted \$1000 bail.

On Sunday the same officers made the arrest of Catherin Risley and a man giving his name as J. C. Johnson who was found in Mrs. Risley's home, charged with the possession of a still near her house on Eagle Creek, at what is known as the Frank Gill homestead, or Log Cabin park. The still was found connected up with her house with wires, the officers stated. At this still were found fourteen fifty-gallon barrels of mash, thirty gallons of the made product as well as coils, pressure tanks, etc.

Mrs. Risley had in her possession at the time of her arrest 26 bottles of beer, the officers stated. The still was very cleverly concealed with leaves, trees and moss. All three of the prisoners were arranged before Judge Campbell on Monday morning.

BETTER WHEAT PRICES

With the opening of this week the grain market has a more promising prospect than it has had for several weeks. On Saturday, the closing quotations at Chicago were \$1.28 1/2 for white winter wheat and buying was active. The prediction was that prices would advance. The Portland quotations yesterday were \$1.28 1/2 for Western Red to \$1.32 1/2 for Bluestem. The Portland dock commission and the grain exporters are conferring together with the purpose of doubling the capacity of the municipal grain elevator and otherwise increasing the facilities for handling the immense quantities of wheat passing through that port in export trade. The experience of the present season showed the wisdom of being prepared for heavy grain business, and the demands will continue to increase.

The closing of the bridge at this particular time is tending where that would come to Estacada should the bridge be open to traffic. Attention was also called to the fact that the sign at Carver calling attention to the detour was insufficient.

The petition was signed by most of the business men of Estacada and addressed to Judge C. W. Kruse. It read:

We, the undersigned business men of Estacada and the surrounding district, realizing the fact that the closing of the Eagle Creek bridge at this time is injuring the holiday trade here to a great extent, hereby join in making an earnest request that more men be put to work on this job and that it be hurried along as much as possible.

We would also call to your attention the detour sign at Carver, which is not in the proper place and is overlooked by many people coming this way. It should be a more conspicuous place.
