John Hamman is home again after a month's visit with his brother and family at Sauvie's Island.

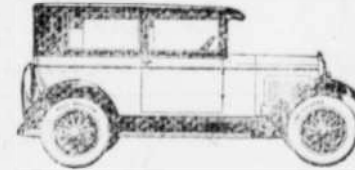
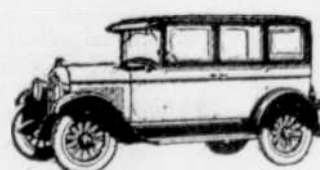
