with facts and interpretations of the probable future trends of production and demand for agricultural products, the idea being that this information would prove useful in planning breeding and planting operations. It is not assumed, in keeping added, that farmers will completely change their systems of farming each year but that through these conferences a greater stability will be had with less violent fluctuation in production.

The poultry committee of which Herman Lafky of Canby was chairman, came out with an optimistic report despite the fact that egg prices in 1927 were lower than in any year since the World war.

State and national information indicates that egg prices in 1928 should be higher because of relatively low cold storage holdings on January 1. On top of that it was brought out that even under present conditions many Clackamas county poultrymen have produced eggs at a profit.

No cause for alarm over the admitted decrease in dairy cattle in the county was seen by the dairy committee, over which John Gaffney of Mount Pleasant presided. Close culling of herds has been brought about by high beef prices and heavy outside demand for cows.

Shortage of legume feeds and ever increasing demand in out of state markets for highest quality dairy products were deemed problems of more concern. Those two points were given considerable attention.

Wesley Theissen, Milwaukie, was chairman of the horticulture committee; farm crops, G. S. Berg of Barlow, was chairman, which committees worked out recommendations which were also presented to the general conference Wednesday.

Notice To Dog Owners

Section 9367, Oregon Laws, as amended by the 1925 Legislature reads as follows:—

EVERY PERSON OWNING OR KEEPING A DOG OVER THE AGE OF 8 MONTHS within the State of Oregon shall, NOT LATER THAN MARCH 1 of each year or within 30 days after he becomes the owner or keeper of such dog, procure from the County Clerk of the county in which said person resides a license for such dog, by paying to the county clerk a license fee of \$1.00 for male or spayed bitch dogs and \$2.00 for female dogs. The county clerk shall issue to such person a license and a metal tag, stamped with the year of issue, the name of the county in which it is issued, with a number thereon corresponding to the number on the license. Said tag shall be attached to a collar to be worn by the dog. The said license shall be for a period of one year from January 1st. ANY PERSON WHO SHALL FAIL TO PROCURE SUCH LICENSE BY MARCH 1st as herein provided shall be required on procuring such license TO PAY AS A PENALTY an additional sum of \$1.00 for each male or spayed bitch dog, or \$2.00 for each female dog. The county assessor and his deputies shall forthwith report to the sheriff and the county clerk all dogs that they shall find that are not licensed as herein provided, together with the owner or keeper thereof.

SECTION 9368. PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO TAKE OUT LICENSE.

Any owner or keeper of any dog who shall fail to procure a license, as provided in section 9367, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of \$10 for each offense together with costs of the proceedings.

You may secure dog license by mail. Send the name of owner, address, sex, and kind of dog, together with the fee as above stated, to County Clerk, Oregon City, Oregon.
