WITH THE COUNTY AGENT

Reports of intentions to plant from the United States department of agriculture indicate an increase of 21 per cent over last year's large potato acreage. The Pacific coast seems to be the only area which will not increase the acreage. "Such production could hardly fail to bring about less favorable market conditions, perhaps as unfavorable as prevailed during the marketing of 1922, 1923 and 1924 crops," according to the report.

In face of these conditions it would seem that the Clackamas county acreage could well be decreased and only the best seed be used on highly productive soil. The market is for a high grade of potato only, and high yields tend to decrease the cost of production.

Low yielding fields result in high cost of production and in many cases poor quality.
