EDITORIAL

Sandy city council announces May 14 as cleanup day. A truck will be sent to residences and junk to be taken away should be cut in front to save time for the driver.

There are many newcomers in the Sandy precincts who should register. No voters may be sworn in at the polls as was permitted under the old law.

The Sandy road district tax is said to be about 7 mills less than last year as only a three mill special was voted for this year. This will help some.

A petition was presented at the council meeting Monday night for a light to be installed in the eastern part of town. Petition was tabled.

The city council voted to remit the 7 per cent city tax to the dance committee for the Jones benefit fund both for the grand dance Saturday night and the I. O. O. F. dance scheduled for April 14, which was a fine thing to do.

The city council asks the county court to condemn the old bridge leading from the highway to the old Bruns farm as the bridge is unsafe. It is planned to close this road, which is a county road, and use the three mill tax voted by the Sandy road district to grade and rock the short stretch leading from the Oregon Trail market road to the Bruns place. This road runs along the south side of the Zeller forty.

A short Easter program, is planned at the Sandy community Sunday school and a committee was asked to decorate the church. Readings and a short program will be given just before the evening service. Miss Tiffany will speak at night.

SANDY LUMBER CO. MILL TO OPERATE

Work will be started at once to get the Sandy Lumber company plant into action again, but it will be a month before the flume can be repaired and the necessary road building completed. The mill will need little overhauling.

The final papers were signed Saturday and W. A. Proctor is now relieved of the receivership. The price was \$12,000.

Sandy Lumber Company, Inc., took over 60 acres of timber with the plant, but the sale does not include all the holdings.

There are 40 local creditors of the company which went into receivership in 1924 and was being pulled out of its indebtedness when a fire destroyed the mill a year later.

Officers of the company are F. J. Bechill, president; A. W. Shipley, secretary; L. E. Hoffman, treasurer. The manager will probably be chosen this week.

DAN MEYER FARM SOLD TO MORRIS DULTZ

Final papers for the sale of the Dan Meyer farm of 25 acres at Cottrell were signed Monday. The new owner is Morris Dultz who lives near the junction of the section line and Rockwood roads. The price was \$7,500. The place has 23 acres cleared, electric lights, water system and good buildings. Meyer will remain on the place until January 1929. The transfer was arranged by George Beers of Sandy.
